Miner and Family Quit Land of Broken Dreams; Find Haven At St. Marys

Worked Only Seven Days Since
Christmas—Hardships
Caused Strike.

HUNGRY MEN RIOT

St. Marys, June 29.—Some interesting light is thrown on the situation in the strike area in Nova Scotia through the arrival here of John Dillon, his wife and family, from Sydney Mines, N. S., where the former has worked as a miner for the past fourteen years.

Conditions there are indeed serious, said Mr. Dillon last night when questioned, and the miners are barely able to exist at all. At best the occupation of mining affords only a poor living and even before the strike living conditions were extremely bad. Mr. Dillon himself has worked only seven days since last Christmas and this was the general experience of hundreds of Nova Scotia miners. Work at any time was very uncertain with the miners averaging about four days a week at the busiest time, while during the winter times were generally slack every year.

Wages were paid on a straight rate of \$1 per ton of coal mined, an exceptionally good day's pay being about \$5, this amount being influenced of course by the number of break-downs or other unforeseen occurrences, which affected the output of the miners. Out of this amount the miners bought their own powder, boring machines and picks; besides paying their union fee of \$1 per month, so that they made only enough for a bare living even before the strike.

Reduction Is Bowed.
The announcement of a 10 per cent reduction naturally came as a severe blow to the miners, who were only too glad to obey the union orders and go to work although at the time they were given to understand that they would receive the regular union strike benefits, which would amount to about \$5 or \$6 per week, depending upon the size of a man's family. Although President Lewis declared he would stand behind the men, all they ever received was \$1 a week from the union, and it was because of the fact that the men had nothing to live on that the looting of stores commenced.

Previous to this everything had been peaceful and quiet, with no hostilities between the men and the company. The latter, apparently, was however, of agitating the miners, wanted troops on the ground from the start, and the arrival of the first detachment about a month ago increased the miners and served to increase the bitter feelings of the men.

The call for relief sent out to Canada and the United States met with a generous response from the first and this was the only thing that allowed the miners to hang out, otherwise they would have been forced back to work at the point of starvation and made to accept the 10 per cent reduction with the company refusing to recognize their union.

Mr. Dillon's own opinion is that the miners will be able to beat the company if the relief continues the same since this is being handled very satisfactorily and the miners are enabled to live about as well as before the strike, but he does not believe that the company can stand the enforced idleness.

Union Faith Lost.
The miners themselves are just uncertain what to do since they have lost faith in the union because of its failure to keep its promises, and this is considerable talk of withdrawing from it altogether after the strike is settled, but at present they are awaiting the result of the negotiations being carried on.
Mr. Dillon was greatly pleased with the clean and beautiful appearance of St. Marys after coming such a long way from the mining district, and he states that large numbers of the miners would be only too willing to leave Nova Scotia were they able to do so, but hardly any of them have any money because of their long idleness, and only a few of them have left up to the present time. Mr. and Mrs. Dillon intend making their future home here.

OUTLOOK IN WEST BETTER EACH DAY

Abundant Rainfall and Ideal
Growing Weather Help
Wheat.

Winnipeg, June 29.—Abundant rainfall and ideal growing weather throughout the Canadian West during the past week has greatly increased the prospects of a bumper yield of wheat and other grains this year, according to the weekly crop report of the Canadian Pacific Railway agricultural department.
Most of the wheat is now in shot blade and has reached a height ranging from 10 to 15 inches at many points. The stand generally is regarded as exceptionally good, although a few districts report slight discoloration due to excessive moisture.
Rust rumors prevalent during the week proved to be without foundation, the report states. The destruction from cutworms has not been extensive, and several areas hailed out have been reserved to other grains. In Manitoba, the Westbourne, Rosefield, Niverville and Doguay districts report a considerable damage as the result from too much rain.

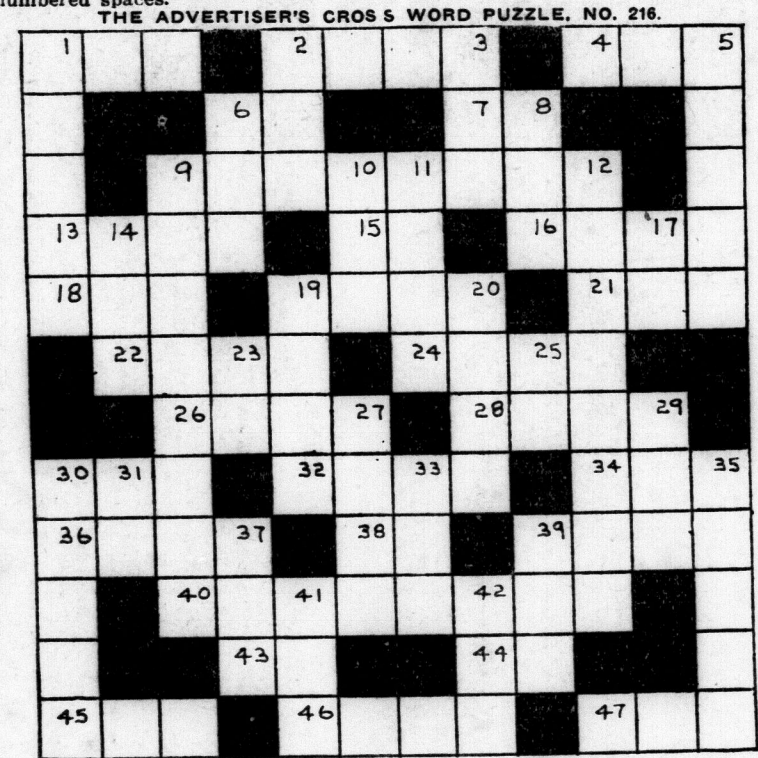

LEAGUE OF EMPIRE SERVICES WORK ON PLANS TO CHANGE EX-WARRIORS INTO SETTLERS

See Need of Fostering Emigration of British Men and Women.

MEETS AT OTTAWA

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, June 29.—"If we fail to develop the magnificent resources of this empire, may they not be taken away from us and given to somebody else?" asked General Sir Andrew Russell of New Zealand, addressing the British Empire Service League here today.
The question of migration of British ex-service men within the empire was under consideration, and Sir Andrew drew a comparison with the man who had one talent and buried it. It was taken away from him, Sir Andrew said, because he failed to use it. The great heritage of the British race might be lost to somebody else if it was not made use of.

After the opening ceremonies and the adoption of reports, the conference of ex-service men of the empire got down to resolutions and intended first the settlement and to appoint a committee of the conference to devise means of promoting more rapid migration of veterans.
Resolution Moved.
Commander A. P. Hett, of Great Britain, moved the resolution, Sir Andrew seconded it. Both urged the need for a settlement under the British Empire settlement act. Capt. W. Appleby, of Great Britain, promised that the British Legion would select for settlement overseas would be suitable men and, above all, its best women. He said the employment service of the legion regarded the selection of the women more important than that of the men. It was the women who would encourage and support the man in his early struggles in a new environment, and he said that the settlers now being sent to the dominions were the agreement with that government were being taken from the county of Northumberland, because they were most suited to the settlement scheme.
Major Dr. W. D. Sharpe, retiring president of the G. W. V. A., spoke for Canada. The dominion needed a great number of settlers, and he said that the individual group settler could make a living in Canada. He suggested that the group system of migration was not as useful to Canada as the individual group settler.
