Agricultural Association Talk Over Matters Affecting the Late Show.


Deficit of Three Thousand Dollars Is Shown In Financial Statement.

The one important thing which the meeting had to deal with was the fact that the deficit of the show was \$3,000 incurred in the holding of the recent exhibition.

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B. Fleming forwarded a communication explaining that the money exhibit had been satisfactorily adjudged.

Mr. W. H. Price explained that the mistake which occurred was due to the fact that the exhibit of Mr. Fleming had been misplaced and the quantities broken up by accident. The board will ex-

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
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in excess of the Alaska output for the entire calendar year 1901, the figures for that year being \$14,970,676. In the output for the last ten months is included \$20,000 expected to arrive from the Klondike before January 1, and \$1,800,000 expected from Nome.

It will be observed that "Director of the Mint, Robert S. Lusk," with a total output of \$18,870,075, while, as a matter of fact, that territory contributes only \$5,000,000, or considerably less than one-third of the total. The bulk of the gold comes from Yukon Territory, which Mr. Roberts sets down as "Klondike." If the authorities at Ottawa would hasten the building of the Canadian mint and take steps to secure the treatment of all Canadian gold at that institution, Mr. Roberts' operations would be very materially curtailed.

Lumbering In Canada

Descriptive Article By One of the Visiting British News-papern.

Importance and Value of Vancouver Island Forests Fully Appreciated.

The following splendid article from the lumber industry of British Columbia is from the Leeds Mercury of October 10.

To the old folks at home in England, life in the backwoods is a synonym for hardship and barbarism. This must be taken as another instance of that ignorance of Canadian affairs of which Canadians so bitterly complain. The English conception is utterly erroneous. To young men, fond of an open-air existence, the life of the log cutter is an ideal one, and the occupation is one of the most popular in Canada.

The pine woods are health-giving in themselves, the tracing air, the nature of the work, the comfortable shanties and ample table provided for the shantymen, the safety of the logs, the return to town life with a large arrears of undrawn pay, the interludes of hunting and fishing, and all the exciting incidents of wild life in the forest, appeal to men whose tastes disdain the more prosaic labor of the farm or the office. The forests of Vancouver Island teem with pheasants, and all day long the song of birds, the tattoo of the woodpecker and the shrill piping of the grouse, fill the woodlands ring. The rifle is often brought out to hunt down the black bear and the panther, crane and skunk upon which the government pays a gratuity.

BOUNDARY MINES ORE SHIPMENTS

Week's Output Exceeds 12,000 Tons—Shipments in Detail.

Phoenix, Nov. 7.—(Special)—Although the Granby smelter has as yet been unable to operate but two furnaces, on account of the unavailability of the ore from the Boundary mines continue to keep up to a good level. The total for the week, 12,028 tons.

The different mines shipped the following amounts of ore:

Mother Lode, to Greenwood smelter, 4,296 tons.

Sunset mine, to Boundary Falls smelter, 990 tons.

B. C. Mine, to Boundary Falls smelter, 720 tons.

Emma, to Greenwood and Boundary smelters, 1,000 tons.

Total for the year to date, 409,778 tons.

The Granby smelter treated 4,045 tons during the week, and 245,438 tons for the year to date.

THE TYEE SMELTER.

The Plant Will Be Ready to Start by December 15.

Ladysmith, Nov. 7.—(Special)—Work at the Tyee smelter has been pushed vigorously, in spite of the disagreeable weather. Mr. Kiddie, the manager, hopes that everything will be ready for the blow-in by the middle of December. All the buildings are being wired throughout for electric light.

ANOTHER BIG DEAL.

United States Capitalists Buy More Mines in Similkameen.

Vancouver, Nov. 7.—(Special)—A. W. Wright, representing capitalists of Indianapolis and Terre Haute, Ind., who recently bought the Portland claims of copper and silver, on the divide between Nicola and Similkameen, has bought adjoining claims for \$75,000.

THE CANADIAN MINT.

Strong Argument for Its Speedy Completion and Operation.

Washington, Nov. 6.—Director of the Mint, Robert S. Lusk, made public his final statement of the gold output of Alaska for the last ten months. These figures are based on the report of the San Francisco, Seattle and the Selby refineries, show a total of \$18,870,075, as follows:

Klondike (Canadian), \$13,861,095.
Nome, \$5,008,980.
This total is something over \$4,000,000 in excess of the Alaska output for the entire calendar year 1901, the figures for that year being \$14,970,676.

FIELD FOR INVESTMENT.

My object in reciting these particulars is to show the field which exists for the investment of British capital in Canadian timber. The wood-pulp industry has come into great prominence in recent years, and has conferred immense value upon the second-growth forests of spruce which abound in every province of the Dominion. Quite a large number of United States companies have engaged in this manufacture, which owing to the vast extent of the inexhaustible water power everywhere, is highly lucrative, and some of the largest pulp mills in Canada are owned by Americans. A similar remark applies to lumber factories, and saw mills, numbers of which have been erected by United States capital along the Canadian shores of Lake Huron and Lake Superior. The Dominion regulations for obtaining timber leases are as generous as the land settlement laws.

Some particulars about the Victoria Lumber & Manufacturing Company will illustrate the profitable nature of the business. This company, for an initial payment of \$5 per acre, acquired the license for twenty-one years to have the timber of 122,000 acres, of which 30,000 linear feet board measure—1 inch thick 12 inches square—but it is nothing uncommon to get 200,000 feet upon an acre, and sometimes the yield per acre is as high as 500,000 feet. The average selling price is \$3 per thousand feet, and this company's production last year was 50 million feet, 44 millions for export and 12 millions for home consumption. All this was Douglas fir—the so-called Oregon pine—this company reserving the cedar and other woods on its property for the present. The capital of the company is \$1,000,000, and I understand that an offer was recently made to buy out the company for \$2,500,000.

THE SAW MILLS.

The saw mills and loading wharves at Chemainus form one of the sights of Canada. Most of the machinery in a Canadian saw mill is similar to that in England, but out here they have appliances for handling the rough logs which are sometimes a mile in extent and contain several millions of feet of lumber. Everything is done mechanically. The logs are raised from the water up an inclined plane, upon which moves an endless pulley, studded with steel teeth, and delivered upon a movable platform running parallel to a stupendous circular saw.

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
