ADVISES FALL PLOWING.

Plowing in the fall for next

spring's crops should be encouraged in most cases because it disributes labor more evenly throughout the year, favors earlier seeding, improves soil structure and kills many insects, says F. A. Welton of the Ohio experiment station. Only on soils subject to washing, on fine clay soils and where catch crops are seeded in the fall is this practice not

Usually there is a rush at \* spring planting time. Farm labor can be used to advantage in the fall when work is slack. Thus crops can be seeded earlier • next spring. At the Ohio experiment station a difference of a \* month in time of planting corn \* made a difference of twentyerage of seven years. Furthermore, the early planted corn had about 10 per cent less moisture \*
