Strange Use of Language.

H. L. Charles, in the Christian at work, gives some amusing instances of the violation of the parity of language by young people, especially boys.

Among the still more common errors in the use of language are these, the mispronouncing of unaccented syllables as terrible for the; the omission of a letter or syllable, as going for going and every for every; and the running of words together, without giving to every one a separate and distinct pronunciation.

I know a boy who says, 'Don't want,' 'whenever you want to go, and where do you go, instead of 'where do you go?'

'Hadderstake.'

'Jerified th'ice hard'n good?'

'Yes; hard'nough.'

'Jergerloner?'

'No; Bill'nJoe wenterlong.'

'Pastate.'

'Lemmeknow wenyergoin', wench?'

'I want'er g'n'showyerhoww-er-er-er.'

'H-m; filoodn't skate better'n you'd sell out aquit.'

'Well, we'll tryen rock, sefyercan.'

Here they took different stances and their conversation ceased. These boys write their compositions grammatically, and might use good language and speak distinctly if they would try. But they have got into this careless way of speaking, and make no effort to get out of it. When they try to speak correctly they have to grope their way along slowly, and their expression seems forced or cramped, as if it were hard work for them to talk.

Every one talks enough to keep well in practice, and those who try to speak correctly on every occasion, soon find that the practice makes it just as easy for them to use the best of language as their command as to use the most common.

Antidotes for Poisons.

In cases where the other articles to be used as antidotes are not in the house, give two table-spoonfuls of mustard mixed in a pint of warm water. Also give large draughts of warm milk or water mixed with oil, butter or lard. If possible, give as follows:—

For Red-Bag poison, Blue Vitrol, Corrosive Sublimate, Lead Water, Saltpetre, Sugar of lead, Sulphate of Zinc, Red Precipitate, Vermilion, give Milk or White of Eggs, in large quantities.

For Fowler's solution, White Precipitate, Arsenic, give prompt Emetic of Mustard and Salt-tablespoonful of Milk; follow with Sweet Oil, Butter or Milk.

For Antimonial Wine, Tartar Emetic, Drink warm water to encourage vomiting. If vomiting does not stop, give a grain of Opium in water.

For Oil Vitriol, Aqua Fortis, Bi-Carbonate Potassa, Muratic Acid, Oxalic Acid, Magnesia or Soap, dissolved in water, every two minutes.

For Caustic Soda, Caustic Potash, Volatile Alkali: Drink freely of water with Vinegar or Lemon juice in it.

For Carbolic Acid: Give Flour and Water of Glutinous starch.

For Central Hydrate, Chloroform: Pour cold water over the head and face, with artificial respiration, Galvanic Battery.

For Carbonate of Soda, Copperas, Opium: Prompt Emetic; Soap or Mustard.

Morphine, Opium: Strong Coffee, followed by Ground Mustard or Green in water, to produce vomiting. Keep in motion.

For Nitrate of Silver: Give common salt in water.

For Strychnine, Tinct. Nux Vomica: Emetic of Mustard or Sulphate of Zinc, added by warm water.

Dr. Feasler, a German chemist, gives a receipt for an insecticide which is said to be excellent. It consists of soft soap, four parts; tobacco extract, six parts; amylic alcohol, five parts; myristic alcohol, twenty parts, and water to make 1000 parts. The extract of tobacco is made by boiling together equal parts of tobacco and water for half an hour, adding sufficient for loss by evaporation. Then the soft soap is gently and gradually dissolved in the water by heat, and the other ingredients added. The mixture should be stirred before using, and applied with a syringe.

Too much green food fed to cattle sometimes causes hoven, which is a distention of the first stomach, in which gas is evolved by the fermentation of the green food. The symptoms are swollen belly and heavy laborious breathing. In the early stages relief may be given by the prompt administration of chloride of lime, in doses of from two to four drachms, or a teaspoonful of pulverized charcoal, every fifteen minutes, in half a pint of water. The last resort is to puncture the stomach. It is best, however, to endeavor to prevent it by making the change from hay to grass gradually.

ROBERT MITCHELL, P. O. A. J. Cook says, in the N. Y. Tribune, that one application of kerosene mixture is a complete cure for lice on plants. He likes best the following mixture: One quart of soft soap, one gallon water, and one pint kerosene. The soap and water are heated to the boiling point, the kerosene is added, and all are well stirred. The mixture is permanent. In every case where this is tried it has killed all the lice and restored the vigor of the tree. A compound of kerosene and milk is not so easily got, is not so readily mixed, and is not so permanent as a mixture, and does not seem to give the trees and shrubs such a send-off as does the soap and kerosene. Prof. Cook uses the kerosene and milk 10 to one. It kills the lice instantly.
