*Selkirk.*—Organized, May, 1893, to take a definite step toward contributing to missionary work. Have adopted the envelope system and find it work well, recommend it to those who find it difficult to meet regularly. Have contributed \$12 during the year. Expect to raise a like amount next year.

*St. Thomas.*—Organized Feb., 1889. Present membership, 16; average attendance, 7. Contributed \$41 for the work during the year, May, '93-'94.

*Toronto.*—Organized April, 1887. Present membership, 47; increase during the year, 5; average attendance, 18. Contributed \$25 to the work during the year.

*Wainfleet.*—Organized Sept., 1884. Number of members at present, 15; average attendance, 9. Contributed, May, '93-'94, \$10. "Wish to keep in touch with the work, even though burdened at home."

*Walkerton.*—Number of members at present, 6; contributed \$25 to the work during the present year. "Will do the best we can during the coming year."

*Warton.*—This auxiliary has 10 members. They report good meetings. Contributed \$10 for year, May, '93-'94.

*West Lake.*—Organized May, 1893, with 8 members. Present membership, 20; average attendance, 9; contributed to work for year, May 1893-4, \$10.; pledge \$10. for coming year for Foreign Missions.

*West Lorne.*—Organized, March 1889. Present membership, 5; average attendance, 5; amount contributed, May, '93-'94, \$7; pledge for next year, \$6. "Hope to do more for our Master this coming year than we have ever done before, realizing how much we owe Him."

*Aylmer.*—No auxiliary here. Have often spoken of forming one.

*Acton.*—Has suffered greatly from removals.

*Cobourg.*—Six sisters here have membership with Bowmanville.

*Cherry Valley.*—A sister writes: "My sister and I are isolated ones. We contribute a little individually."

*Greenore.*—One sister here contributes \$5.

*Georgetown.*—"Have a Ladies' Aid Society in order to help the home church, as it is greatly in need of help. Hope at some future time to become an auxiliary."

*Glencairn.*—Is in sympathy with our work and contributes to the foreign funds.

*Iona.*—A sister contributes \$5 a year to the work.

*Kilsyth.*—The sisters here are in full sympathy with the work. They observe O. C. W. B. M. Day. Total contributions to the work during the year were \$19.50.

*Ridgetown.*—Has a Ladies' Aid Society for the home church. Probably at a later date will be able to assist.

*Stayner.*—The church here observed O. C. W. B. M. Day. Contributed \$10.75 to the work.

*Toronto Junction.*—The sisters here feel that the financial condition of the church is such that they would not be justified in sending out any money they raise.

*Portage la Prairie.*—The sisters here have organized in the interests of foreign work. The Sunday-school contributed \$15. Pledge from the sisters for coming year, \$5.

A sister writes: "I do hope the sisters in Ontario will not give up the work in Manitoba; surely good can be done here."

In conclusion, let us, during the coming year, go forward with renewed zeal, bending our energies to the extension of the work both at home and abroad. Praying and working to this end that the blessing of the Father of all may rest with us.

#### FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S MISSION BANDS AND JUNIOR ENDEAVOR SOCIETIES OF ONTARIO.

It is with much pleasure that I present the report of Children's Work this year, as it shows more and better work done by the majority, and also that every band has been represented by funds sent in, though not quite all have sent reports. This being the case, we have, in spite of our fears to the contrary, sufficient funds to meet all our obligations and still have a balance in hand.

The Erin "Helping Hands" report a membership of 21; have held meetings regularly through the year with four exceptions, and have had an average attendance of 12. The total amount raised during the year was \$10.08, all of which has been forwarded to the Treasurer. A quilt was made by the band and sent to Muskoka, which was a very wise proceeding.

The Wainfleet Band has been working under difficulties, but have succeeded in raising the sum of \$6.25. Owing to the long distances the children had to walk, the plan was tried of dividing them, and holding meetings in two places instead of one, and their fees and the proceeds of a concert procured them the above named sum. They have done well.

The Bowmanville "Coral Workers" report a present membership of 51, being the same number as last year. They have the honor of being the Banner Band this year, having raised in all the sum of (?) They have made six scrap books, three for China, and the other three for Japan. An autograph quilt has been made beside. The study of the life of Paul has been taken in the meetings, and best of all, eleven have united with the church.

The Everton "Workers for the Master" have been very busy and successful. They have 21 names on their roll, being a few less than last year. Their report shows a total of \$27.50, \$15.50 of this sum having been sent to the Treasurer, and the balance, \$12, has been sent to Miss Riach to help provide Bibles for the scholars. The Band has exceeded their pledge to the amount of \$5.50. For studies they have taken Bible Character and Temperance.

The Guelph Junior Endeavor Society have a membership of 37, being an increase of nine as reported last year. Fifteen of this number have united with the church during the year, which is highly satisfactory. The total amount of money raised is \$16.34,

\$8 of which has been sent to the Treasurer, being the amount of their pledge.

The Kilsyth "Cheerful Givers" have increased their membership a little this year, and now number 30. They have been taking up "Temperance" as a study, and gave a temperance entertainment. A sewing circle in connection with the band has been busy during the latter part of the year, and the results of their work and concert realized the sum of \$8.81 of which \$6.00 was handed to the treasurer. One little girl, aged eleven, has united with the church since last report.

The Toronto (Cecil St.) Junior Endeavor Society report a membership of 51, with an average attendance of 28 for the last year. They hold their meetings on Lord's day at 4.15 p. m., the first Sunday in the month being a missionary meeting. Collections for the year amounted to \$15.96, \$4.00 of which was for Foreign Missions, and was sent to the Treasurer.

The Walkerton "Cheerful Givers," who for the past three years have succeeded in raising the largest amount of money, have suffered severely from the loss of their president, but, as they are now reduced to three or four in number and have raised \$10.00 for Foreign Missions, they have done well and have sent in a larger average amount than any other band.

The Brant "Band of Promise" report a membership of eight, being just the same as last year. They have sent in the sum of \$4.00 for Foreign Missions, and have taken up the study of the Gospel according to Mathew.

The Owen Sound "Golden Links" have confined their operations this year almost entirely to the work of the sewing circle. The proceeds of the sale of their work, together with articles contributed by friends, realized the sum of eight dollars. A grant of one collection from the Sunday-school and other small sums made a total of \$10.00. Finding a little difficulty in gaining the regular attendance of the members during the week, the plan has been tried of holding a short meeting immediately after the S. S. sessions on the first Lord's day in the month. This seems to be working well, and will prove a success in the future. We have a membership of 27, of whom none have united with the church.

The Lobo "Cheerful Givers" sent in a contribution of \$3.25, being the offerings of a class in the S. S., and half the proceeds of a concert given by the Y. P. S. C. E. They have held no regular meetings this last year.

The "Little Band of Two" in Cherry Valley have again sent in their contribution of \$1. Myra and Maurice Garrison are setting an example to many others who have the same opportunities and do nothing.

The Milton, N. S., "Daily Workers" have forwarded a contribution of \$27 during the past year. They have 46 names on their roll, and are doing a great work, principally in visiting the sick and poor; each member being pledged to pay four visits per month.

The reason why they have sent us their contribution was that they united with the Ontario Bands before those of the Maritime Provinces began any separate work, and did not feel at liberty to withdraw.

The following bands have contributed funds without sending a report:—

St. Thomas C. E. S., \$10; London, \$3; Warton, \$3; Ridgetown, \$4.

The total number of children in the bands who have reported are 310. The total amount of money raised during the year is \$150.33, which with a

contribution of \$5 from a former president, \$10.50 sent too late for insertion in the Treasurer's report, \$1.75 interest, and a balance from last year of \$39.30, make a grand total of \$206.88. Our obligations are \$150.00 pledged to the O. C. W. B. M., and two years' subscription for the support of our boy in Nankin.

A recent letter from Bro. Meigs informs us that Wau Wang Hai is still attending the Mission school. He is a bright boy, and is now studying Advanced Arithmetic, Algebra, Physical Geography, the Bible and Chinese Classics, besides a little English. He is not a Christian yet, but we must hope and pray that he may soon become one. This report shows unmistakable proof of growth in every way in the various bands, and my thanks go out to them for making it possible. Shall we not strive more earnestly to make it more thoroughly successful for the coming year?
