A HUMAN WINDMILL.

A WORKMAN WHOSE ARMS GROW OUT OF HIS BACK.

In a small one-story frame dwelling, situated opposite the freight depot of the Danbury & Norwalk Railroad at Norwalk, the New York World correspondent discovered a curious example of human deformity, whose existence has been preserved a secret for nearly seventeen years. At the house mentioned, Thomas Hazdon, a railway laborer, and his wife live, with their son Tom.

This boy was born, seventeen years ago, a misshapen mite of humanity. By the advice of his parish priest, the sorrowing parents have carefully concealed him from the public gaze. When the correspondent called at the house, Sunday, the unfortunate boy was found half sitting and half reclining in an invalid's easy chair. He is totally devoid of shoulders, and from the centre of his back two arms, with well-formed hands, grow from a single joint. The hands and arms are devoid of the power of feeling, and are also afflicted with a strange, continual motion, sweeping around in a circle like a windmill, the arms being stretched out at full length and moving in opposite directions. The motion never ceases, except when the arms are tied together, and they are covered with scars from contact with the wall, table, chair, etc. His body is further deformed by the jolting of the legs as far as the knees. Here the right leg is turned back and upward until the heel strikes the centre of the back, where it is firmly imbedded in the flesh. He is mentally bright, and conversed freely and intelligently with the reporter about the few books his parents had been able to provide for him and about articles he had read in the newspapers, which are occasionally supplied to him. Said his mother: "He is a great care to us, being unable to help himself at all. But he is just as dear to me as if he was like other children. I suppose he could be exhibited, but as long as his father or myself have life in our bodies to care for him he shall never be."

THE LATE MISS FARNELL

TRIBUTES TO THE PATRIOT FEELING AND CONDOLENCE WITH A REVERED MOTHER.

New York, July 23.—There was a large attendance at the meeting of the Municipal Executive Council, Irish National League of America, at Germania Hall last night. All the party branches were fully represented. The President, Mr. J. P. Ryan, occupied the chair, and the Secretary, Mr. J. B. M. Shiel, kept the record.

SANITARY CONDITION OF OCEAN STEAMSHIPS.

London, July 28.—A deputation of the British Medical Association and several members of Parliament called upon Mr. Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, to-day, and asked him to appoint a committee to consider the inadequate medical and sanitary arrangements of the Atlantic steamers. They commented strongly upon want of proper precautions on emigrant vessels, from which a large annual sacrifice of life resulted, and suggested that shipowners be compelled to increase the pay of ship surgeons, and that the American Government be requested to contribute a small sum towards the expenses of vaccinating passengers. Mr. Chamberlain replied that he intended to introduce in Parliament next year a bill dealing with the subject.

DEATH OF OETEWAY.

London, July 25.—The War Office has been informed by a special despatch just received from Durban that Oeteway has been killed. The despatch states that after the defeat sustained by Oeteway and his followers at the hands of Ullibepu and his army, reported on Monday, the former fled with his troops, closely pursued by the victors. The latest information goes to show that Ullibepu overtook Oeteway, and during the resistance made by the latter massacred him and most of his followers. The news has produced a profound sensation in London.
