SEARCH FOR MISSING ARMY INTELLIGENCE
OFFICER

On the orders of the day:

Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon-Souris): I have a question for the Minister of National Defence. Could the hon. gentleman inform the house whether the search for Captain Flewin of the Canadian army intelligence service, who went missing on a flight from Toronto to Ottawa on January 17 last, I think it was, is still continuing?

I am informed that the search was called off on January 27 after 12 days of intensive search activities. It will be resumed in the springtime as soon as there is more real hope of being able to pick up the trail. An area of 97,000 square miles was covered and a total of 840 flying hours involved in the search activities up to January 27.

Mr. Hellyer: Mr. Speaker, I am sure we would be as welcome in Cape Breton as we are in all other parts of the country.

Mr. MacInnis: Mr. Speaker, I did intend a further supplementary question. I must compliment the minister on speaking very well on behalf of what the Cape Bretoners' attitude will be, but my question was directed to him and to the attitudes of his own cabinet colleagues. I will ask him directly, is there a directive which suggests that they do not go to Cape Breton?
