from his own standpoint, had no control, finds himself in the position where he is now a university president.

I think there are many factors in this matter which deserve very careful consideration. My own feeling offhand, in agreeing that we must avoid partisanship, is that perhaps the best way to avoid partisanship is to recognize the fact that there is partisanship and we are going to accept responsibility by having the best appointments made by political officers who have a responsibility to the country as a whole. However, Mr. Chairman, that matter can be discussed much better, I think, tomorrow morning. May I call it ten o'clock, Mr. Chairman?

Mr. Churchill: Mr. Speaker may I ask the acting house leader whether he intends to go ahead with this bill tomorrow or let public opinion have something to say about it and switch to some other subject.
