ACTION TO OFFSET IMPACT OF UNITED STATES IMPORT SURTAX ON SMALL FRUITS AND POTATOES

REQUEST FOR ALLOCATION OF PORTION OF FUNDS UNDER EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT BILL TO PRODUCERS

Mr. A. P. Gleave (Saskatoon-Biggar): I should like to address a supplementary question to the Prime Minister. Has the government received representations from Mr. Turner, president of the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, that a portion of the \$80 million designed to assist those sectors of the economy affected by the U.S. import surcharge should be allocated for agricultural producers? If so, can he inform the House as to the nature of the government's reply?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I did reply to a letter along these lines indicating that certain sectors of the agricultural community would benefit from their share of the \$80 million when it had to do with agricultural products which were processed in some way. As to the others that would not qualify for any share of that amount, I repeated what the Minister of Agriculture had told the House, namely, that we would use existing legislation where possible and necessary to assist the agricultural sector of the economy.

Mr. Speaker: The hon. member for Surrey-White Rock.

Mr. Gleave: I have a supplementary question.

Mr. Speaker: I apologize to the hon. member for Surrey-White Rock but perhaps I might allow a supplementary question to the hon. member for Saskatoon-Biggar. Again I bring to the attention of hon. members that if we have three, four or more supplementary questions we will again run short of time.

Mr. Gleave: May I ask the Prime Minister whether in the Department of Agriculture or any other agency of the government there is in hand a definite program which will attempt to deal with various agricultural products as they are affected by the U.S. policy?

Mr. Trudeau: I will refer the question to the Minister of Agriculture and perhaps he can be invited by the hon. member to answer the question in the House.

Mr. Speaker: The hon. member for Surrey-White Rock.

Mr. MacDonald (Egmont): Mr. Speaker, I wish to rise on a point of order.

Mr. Speaker: I am sorry; the hon. member for Surrey-White Rock has his difficulties today. Again I have to apologize to him, but the hon. member for Egmont is rising on a point of order.

Mr. MacDonald (Egmont): Mr. Speaker, this is the second occasion on which the Prime Minister has indicated that the House will have to wait for the Minister of Agriculture. As the question involves many perishable products and the minister has been absent from the House for some days, would it not be possible for some member of the administration to answer these important questions so that the farmers of this country may know where they stand?
