Mr. John Kushner (Calgary East): Madam Speaker, on November 16 Calgary City Council was forced to pass a motion unanimously to spend \$20,000 on an advertising campaign in eastern Canada advising Canadians of the housing shortage in Calgary. Calgary City Council's motion also urged the federal government to reconsider its decision to abandon the MURB program. Therefore, Madam Speaker, as Canada is now in the midst of a housing crisis of enormous proportions, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Don Valley West (Mr. Bosley):

That this House no longer has confidence in the Minister of Public Works responsible for housing and the Minister of Finance for creating a crisis and disaster situation in housing, for threatening thousands of jobs in construction and other related industries across the country, and that the government reintroduced the MURB and soft-cost allowance program immediately to give urgently needed incentive and hope to people in need of homes.
