Mr. Regan: I can assure the hon. member that, in my view, it is in the interest of the Canadian taxpayers when you can attract to this country something that leaves, as this occasion did, \$4 million in direct expenditures in the city of Montreal, plus all the publicity that was achieved; that is very worthwhile.

Mr. Regan: I cannot give the hon. member an exact figure because my department was not the only department of government involved.

BEAUFORT SEA DEVELOPMENT DECISIONS

Mr. Jim Fulton (Skeena): Madam Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. As the minister knows, the Beaufort Sea environment assessment review has been delayed by Dome, Gulf and Esso by their failure to submit information, and by their dispute over the relative risks of tanker traffic and pipelines in the Arctic. The minister has denied access to funds in the energy envelope to the departments with responsibility in the north, and has now

put pressure on his colleague, the Minister of the Environment, to come up with ways of making decisions before the environmental assessment is complete. Will the minister explain to the House how it is possible to make major drilling and production decisions when he has provided "no funds to discharge our own statutory responsibilities"?

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): As usual, Madam Speaker, the hon. member is in error.

PROTECTION OF ENVIRONMENT

Mr. Jim Fulton (Skeena): Madam Speaker, as usual, I will be releasing the letter from the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources to the Minister of the Environment at the end of the question period to the press, and perhaps then the Canadian public can make its own decision.

The Minister of the Environment has objected directly to the minister regarding the pressure he has put on him. In particular, the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources has given \$400 million to accelerate exploration in the Mackenzie Delta and \$2 billion to assist the oil industry, while at the same time denying a few thousand dollars to intervenors and government departments in order to protect the most fragile environment in the world. The Minister of the Environment says, "we would be remiss to accelerate the review process unduly and then find that the economics of the situation do in fact preclude early development". Does the minister of Energy, Mines and Resources intend to take the advice of his colleague, the Minister of the Environment, or is he going to forge ahead and support the oil industry, regardless of the social and environmental consequences, and regardless of his and his colleagues' statutory responsibilities?

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Madam Speaker, the Minister of the Environment and myself are working very closely together, and I support the steps taken by that minister.

ACCEPTANCE OF APPLICATIONS—EFFECT OF RESTRAINT GUIDELINES

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Leader of the Opposition): Madam Speaker, will the minister responsible for FIRA tell the House whether acceptance of FIRA applications by the federal government will now be conditional upon foreign companies or Canadian subsidiary companies implementing the government's 6 per cent and 5 per cent guidelines?

Hon. Herb Gray (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce and Minister of Regional Economic Expansion): Madam Speaker, we have not created any such stipulation. If
