leavy Export Demand and Lack of Snow Protection Chief Influences.

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—Wheat showed buoyancy today, notwithstanding evidence of free realizing sales on each fractional advance. Liberal export demand had much to do with sending prices higher. There was a steady close at a gain of %c to %c, compared with last night. Corn finished %c to ½c up, and oats dearer ½c to ½c, but provisions 12½c to 27½c down.

Export sales of wheat here, amounting to 700,000 bushels, were brought to light. Other purchases intended for Europe cropped out in Nebraska. At the same time, virtually all cable advices were on the side of buyers. World

World shipments promised to be small, offerings from Argentina were meagre, and there was a continuance of unusual cold in France. Australian advices told of active speculative demand based on unexpected shortness of yield, and on liberal sales to Japan.

More activity was displayed during the last hour in the wheat pit than for any similar period before in three months. In addition to the bullish news relating to the export situation,

news relating to the export situation, there was high authority for statements that outside of Michigan and northern Indiana the entire winter crop region was completely unprotected by snow.

Corn for Shipment.

In the corn crowd, experience ranged from a condition of dulness early to one of strength and lively trade later on. There was a material improvement in the shipping demand. Predictions of cold weather cut a good deal of figure with some of the bulls. Other dealers, tho, were guided largely by the upturn

in wheat.

Oats merely followed the more important lefeals, and did not expand much in the volume of business.






