RUSSIAN STOWAWAYS REALLY BOLSHIEVKS
Came to Victoria With Canadians, Evidently as Special Emisaries.

Victoria, B.C., June 20.—Disguised as Canadian soldiers the eight Russian stowaways who succeeded in boarding the transport Mont Eagle at Vladivostok are believed to be Bolshevik emissaries sent out to this country with the object of spreading Bolshevik propaganda.

COUNCIL CONFIRMS PLAN OF ADVANCE
Marshal Foch and Allied Chiefs Explain Details of Proposed Arrangements.

Paris, June 20.—The supreme council confirmed today the plans made by the military authorities for a resumption of the advance into Germany in the event of the failure of the Germans to sign the peace treaty within the allotted time.

U. S. LABOR URGES FREEDOM FOR IRELAND
Atlantic City, N.J., June 20.—Organized labor today endorsed the league of nations which has obtained from the cable message from President Wilson, has been weakened, although not in giving its approval by a vote of 29,750 affiliated organizations against the A. F. of L. made it clear that "nothing in the endorsement could be construed as denying the right of self-determination and freedom to Ireland as recognized in this convention." An amendment containing the Irish provision was adopted unanimously.

CANADIANS ARRESTED FOR EPSOM RIOTS

London, June 20.—It is now reported that nine Canadians, some with hand-gangs, have been arrested at Woodcock Camp in connection with the Epsom rioting, and have been taken to London. Also that 500 troops have been sent to Epsom, where all is now quiet.

EBERT WILL RESIGN RATHER THAN SIGN THE PEACE TREATY
