HOT WAVE FROM THE WEST.

"Hottest day of the season" seemed to be the general opinion yesterday. As a matter of fact there have been only two days this summer with higher temperature.

The hot wave came from the west. Winnipeg sweltered with 98 degrees registered. Minnedosa had 96, and Qu'Appelle 90.

In only five Septembers since 1890 has 90 been reached. In September, 1895, on the 11th, it was 93; on Sept. 10, 1897, 92; on Sept. 2, 1898, 90, and on Sept. 2, 1900, 90 degrees.

FIRE AMONG RUBBISH.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

MUST ABATE NUISANCES CITY SERVED WITH WRIT

Cataract Company Will Name New Arbitrator—Two Sensational Arrests.

Hamilton, Sept. 7.—(Special.)—Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, reported to the board of health this evening that he had found pigs fighting for the blood that flowed from the slaughter house of George Stroud, and that pigs were also seen eating the offal from slaughtered animals. He said that he would summon Mr. Stroud, and ask for an order to confiscate the pigs in order that they may be destroyed, and not sold for food.

Mr. Stroud will also be served with a notice to desist from the practice of slaughtering animals on his premises until he erects suitable buildings.

After a formal investigation, notices will be served on the following to abate alleged nuisances existing near the coal oil inlet: The City Corporation, George Stroud, the Fowler Canadian Company, the W. A. Freeman Company, and the G. T. R. The city's offence consists in allowing piles of sludge to gather at the disposal works, and the sewers committee will be asked to fill in the arm of the coal oil inlet with the sludge.

Steel Copper Wire. This afternoon, Detectives Couiter, Beasley and Miller made a couple of sensational arrests. Their prisoners were Harry Saunders, alias Young, 46 1-2 North James-street, and Fred Haddfield, 47 East Macaulay-street, who are charged with stealing 300 pounds of copper wire from the Cataract Power Company. Both are married men with families. They have been employed as linemen by Woodman Bros., who have the contract of doing all line work for the Cataract Company. It is alleged that the stealing was done during the noon hour.

Strike Hitches. G. Parry Jenkins, F.R.A.S., and H. Bernard of this city say that they have struck it rich in the gold fields in Northern Ontario.

This afternoon the Press Nine was vanquished by a score of 11 to 7 by the team of the "Shadow Behind the Throne," that is playing at the Grand Opera House. The proceeds will go to the consumption sanitarium.

The street railway men and the company had a meeting this afternoon. The company assured the men that it would appoint an arbitrator to take the place of William Bell. The company said the delay in making the appointment was caused by the difficulty of getting a man to act. Several had been asked to act, but had declined.

TORONTO JUNCTION.

Toronto Junction, Sept. 7.—From the time the work was first started there seems nothing to have held back the construction of the new C.P.R. repair shops. The roofing is now nearly completed, and soon another great force of the right sort of artisans will take their place in the making of Canada's next city.

The local ice supply is about exhausted. As soon as the lumber arrives the Weston-road bridge repairs will be completed. Much traffic passes over the bridge, as it is, but there is constant danger owing to the immense quantities of debris thrown up at each end. Whenever a drove of cattle leaves the stock yards for the city it is customary to drive them by way of Keele to Dundas-streets, and as the intersection of these streets is at all times a busy place it is apparent that some other route should be used. Most people think there has been too much delay in repairing the bridge, and they hope for an early ending of the annoyance.

Owen Healey and Chas. Murphy were to-day before Magistrate Ellis charged with selling bottled beer from a wagon a month ago on the flats near the Canada Foundry. Constable Furler said he had seen two bottles passed over to Chas. Joly; the defence was that a dozen bottles were ordered by Edward O'Orsay, who had wanted Joly to have two. Jas. Haverson, K.C., was lawyer for the defence, and created a stir by asking Constable Ford as his first query, "Have you stopped beating your wife yet?" a question which can't be answered satisfactorily with a "yes" or "no." Ford considered the question an insult, and said so. His wife was dead, he said. Haverson persisted in demanding an answer, and Magistrate Ellis said he had a right to the query.

Mr. Haverson claimed that the accused had a perfect right to sell liquor in Toronto Junction, but that dealers could not solicit orders in town while local option was in force. Orders, however, could be sent to city stores by phone and this apparently was a common practice. The case was dismissed.

Shareholders have received in dividend \$22,350,000, or about 25 per cent. of the value of the output. It is estimated that the cost of production has been 8.2 cents per lb. of copper. During 1906 the production should be close to 100,000,000 lb. and the dividends \$6,000,000. Despite the great opportunity for financial games, the management has been consistently straightforward and honorable. The mine has been conducted as a sound business and in a conservative manner the effect of which has been beneficial to the reputation of the copper industry of Michigan.—Mining and Scientific Press, San Francisco.
