SIR CHARLES TUPPER'S CONDEMNATION OF THE GOVERNMENT.
The Liberal-Conservative Association of Ward 1 are to be congratulated on the success of their open air meeting in Riverside Park last night. There was an immense turnout of people from all sections of the city and from the enthusiasm displayed by the great crowd it was manifest that the city of Toronto still retains its old-time loyalty for the Conservative party and its leaders. The only regrettable feature of the meeting was the inability of so many thousands to hear the speakers. Those who arrived at the scene of the demonstration before the start of the meeting were disappointed to find the speaker's platform so far from the front of the park that they were unable to see the speaker. The speaker, Sir Charles Tupper, had to limit his remarks to one hour, but during that time he was able to make out a strong indictment against the Government. In the first part of his speech he showed that the Government had initiated no legislation that had added to the prosperity of the country, and that the preferential tariff was not increased the exports from Great Britain into Canada by a single dollar, while the country had increased over twenty millions. Sir Charles was correct in saying that the preferential tariff was indicative of nothing but sham loyalty to the Mother Country.
