Hamilton, July 30.—Assistant Postmaster H. A. Eager received word this morning from Norfolk, Va., that his son, J. Hudson Eager, aged 45, had been drowned. How he met his death is not known. He was the son of H. A. Eager, assistant postmaster of this city, who, with his wife, has just returned to the family residence, 182 West Jackson-street, after a visit of some duration in Los Angeles, California. The deceased was born in Hamilton, 45 years ago, and at the completion of his education entered the employ of Wood, Vallance & Co., where he remained for some years until he went to Detroit. The deceased was married while in the "Wolverine City," and subsequently removed to Norfolk, Virginia, where he was employed as a clerk. He occupied the responsible position of buyer for the White Hardware Company. Two years ago he spent some time here visiting his family and renewing the acquaintances of his boyhood days. His wife, Mary, and two daughters, Miss Anna and Miss Helen, are residing at the family home, 182 West Jackson-street.

John Skinner died to-day at his residence, 103 West King-street. He was 68 years of age. He was a well-known maker and jeweler.
