The Question of the Union.

The question of the Union appears to be the pivot upon which the street railway controversy turns. The Company and their friends say that no corporation could submit to be dominated by the Union. Very true; but the Union asks the same forbearance from the corporation. What the Union claim is this: That the Company after the strike last fall took arbitrary means of eliminating unionism from the ranks of their employes, by admonishing each new man against joining the union and by giving preferential treatment to non-union men. These are grievnces which could be ventilated in a ourt of arbitration, and people could then judge whether the complaints are founded or not. It is said a person rarely forgives one whom he has injured, and the Company doubtless found it hard to exercise loving kindness toward the employes whom they drove into a strike last fall: but it would have paid the Company a hundred fold to have swallowed their chagrin and entered into a frank understanding with the Union, putting the latter on their honor and dignity before the public. Public opinion would not tolerate arrogant or unreasonable conduct on the part of the men-the Company may be assured of that. The men believed that the complete unionizing of the road was their only means of self-preservation; but even that was a point they were will-

ing to submit to arbitration. We venture to say there is not a citizen of London who does not believe that if the Company so desired spect of the public.

they could work smoothly and harmoniously with the strikers. The idea of a small body of workingmen oppressing a rich corporation like the London Street Railway Company is a

The Policy of Drift. We cannot compliment the City Council as a whole on handling the Street Railway strike thus far with anything like courage or statesmanlikeness. Those who do not believe in such a thing as hypnotic influence, must wonder why some, who a year ago appeared to wish they possessed two tongues with which to speak up for organized labor, now stand as mice might in the presence of

some powerful influence. With even the most upright members of the Council men like Ald. Greenlees, for instance, there seems to be some confusion of thought. He said he did not ride on the cars, and was a sincere friend of the men; yet, on the other hand, he denied the justice of forcing people to join any union, and so on. Well, what about forbidding people, practically, to belong to a labor organization? However, Ald. Greenlees has evidently not as yet fully digested the whole situation. When he does, he will doubtless strike a firmer note: for to do him justice, it is seldom Ald. Greenlees talks on both sides of a question in one speech.

It will be necessary for the City Council as a whole to manifest greater courage, and a larger view of the rights of the citizens whose representatives they profess to be, if our municipal parliament is to retain the intellectual re-

The minister of foreign affairs, Baron Von Buelow, replied, saying: "I have no objection to again define our attitude on the Samoan ques-tion. We shall not depart from the stipulations of the Samoa treaty, nor allow others to turn us from our course. We recognize the rights of others while maintaining our own. I repeat emphatically that we will take no side in the local disputes or in regard to the candidates for the throne.
