League of professional baseball clubs met yesterday in the Fifth Avenue Hotel and made preparations for an eightclub circuit, to consist of the following clubs already in the league: Montreal, Toronto, Syracuse, Springfield and Providence; the Hartford club, which was taken in from the Atlantic League in exchange for Wilkesbarre, a club which will be chosen from three applying for admission from Worcester, Mass., and the club which a special committee shall consider the most desirable after investigation from other clubs applying for admission in Albany, Rochester, Utica, Hamilton and Londor, Canada. Hamilton and London were represented by William Stroud by wire and mail, and the representatives of the M-intreal and Toronto clubs also acted for them at the meeting. Stroud offered \$5,000 for a franchise. The Ottawa franchise in the league was held by President Powers to be disposed of at the most advantageous terms, and

its resignation from the league left a place to be filled. There was an attempt on the part of a strong party in the league to get Toronto and Montreal out of the league, and put in two strong baseball cities in New York. These clubs declined to leave the league, and this part of the play was dropped. Draper, of Providence, and some of the others were strongly inclined toward London or Hamilton, Ont., because of the low railway fares and hotel bills charged in Canada. President Powers, with Mr. Campbell, of Toronto,

A STRANGE DUKE

Who Died Recently-Northumberland's Annoying Antics.

Among the peculiar privileges possessed by the Duke of Northumberland, and which was exercised the other day, is the rare hereditary prerogative of interment in Westminster Abbey. Formerly many great families possessed this right. But they have either become extinct or have allowed the privilege to lapse. The Northumberland vault in Westminster Abbey is beneath the St. Michael's Chapel, and the last member to be interred there was the consort of the old duke, who died about four years ago. She was a daughter of the great banker, Henry Drum-mond, so well known as one of the founders of the church originated by Edward Irving.

The duchess converted her husband to her own religious views, and his was probably the only ducal table in the world at which there was always at meal times one seat vacant, reserved for the coming of Christ. This was even reserved at state banquets and grand dinners. The duke, it may be added, was a strict vegetarian.

Probably the most noteworthy incident of the career of the late duke was when he considered it to be his duty as one of the greatest nobles of the British Empire to ask and obtain an audience of the Queen for the purpose of reproaching her majesty with the conduct of her eldest son, of whom he cordially disapproved, his royal highness' fondness for games of hazard, and his admiration for the fair sex, calling forth the wrath of the old nobleman.

In fact, for many years he deemed it to be his particular mission to go about in society warning people against the Prince of Wales, whom he denounced as "a son of perdition, a lost soul, and as an absolutely undesirable companion for the young."

The prince, naturally, was greatly annoyed, and he, too, complained to the Queen, who in the most sensible manner soothed his anger by pointing out that she herself had been a sufferer through the old peer, since he had assailed her with reproaches in connection with the excessive grief which she had manifested at the loss of her husband. The duke regarded this as wicked in the extreme, and did not hesitate to tell her majesty so.
