P.S.—Am enclosing recipe for cold meat relish. Hope some of the Pages will try it and see how they like it. Cold Meat Relish.—One quart each cucumber and onions. One large cauliflower, two green peppers. Chop fine, sprinkle with salt and let stand overnight. Drain off next morning. Add

one quart vinegar, three cups white sugar, two ounces mustard seed, half ounce celery seed (I use chopped celery, one bunch). Let come to a boil. Make a paste of half cup flour, quarter cup mustard, quarter ounce turmeric. Pour over pickle. Let simmer for twenty minutes.

Chow-Chow.
Take six cucumbers just before they ripen, peel and cut in strips and remove the seeds, four white onions, six good-sized heads of cabbage, chop all fine; let them stand in salt water overnight. Then pour off the water and add vinegar and spices to suit taste.

Piccaililli.
One peck green tomatoes, one dozen onions, six red peppers, one-half ounce ginger, one-quarter of an ounce of mace, one tablespoonful of black pepper, one box of mustard, 5 cents' worth of celery seed, one pound of brown sugar, slice onions, tomatoes, and peppers, put in a jar with salt.

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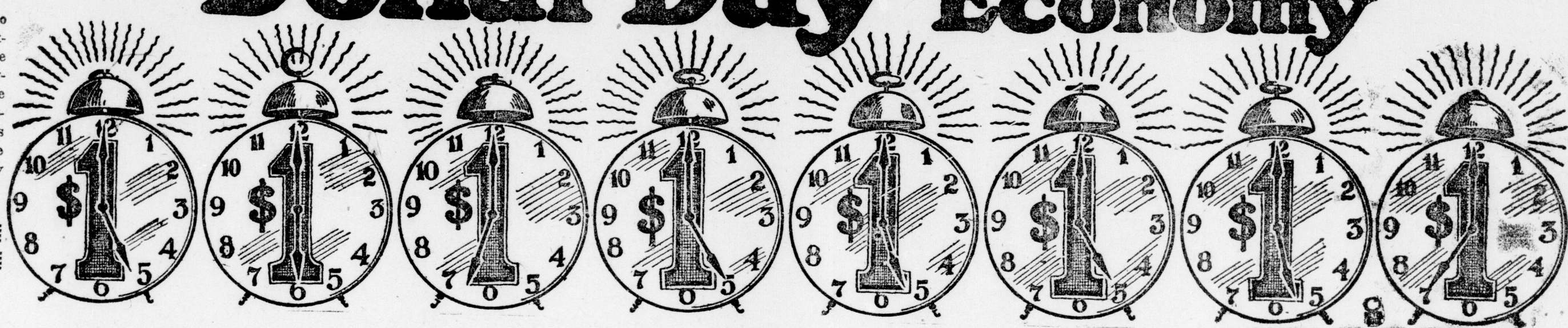
