SYNOD MEMBERS SCORE UNION GOVERNMENT'S PENSION POLICY, WANT JUST TREATMENT FOR ALL

Rev. S. E. McKegney, M.C., Says Case After Case Is Coming Up of Soldiers and Dependents Not Getting a Square Deal.

A case brought before the Synod of the Diocese of Huron of what was termed "gross injustice" in connection with the amount of pension paid by the government to a woman whose son was killed at the front, and who is the widow of a soldier, aroused the representatives to vigorous and unanimous protest yesterday afternoon, and the protest was incorporated in a resolution to be sent to all members of Parliament who are members of the Anglican Church.

Rev. J. E. Fotheringham of Grace Church, Brantford, who brought the matter before the synod because of the principle involved, as well as with a view to fighting a wrong, also submitted the resolution, the first section of which placed the synod on record as holding the conviction that a "just and generous policy should be pursued in the treatment of soldiers and the dependents of soldiers."

The story, which evoked strongly expressed indignation in all quarters, is as follows:

Preposterous Treatment.

"A woman, who, as the widow of a soldier, is entitled to a pension in the Diocese of Huron, is receiving an annual allowance from the widows' and orphans' fund, but her son in the war. She was entitled to a pension from the Government of \$40 a month, or \$480 a year.

"Officials of the pensions board, learned that she was receiving an allowance from the church fund of \$300 a year, her Government pension was reduced to \$130 per annum, leaving her total at \$180, the amount which she was entitled to from the Government."

"It was equivalent to the pensions board saying: 'We will take away the \$200 which the synod has given you.' It makes no sense at all," said Mr. Fotheringham, "and I think it would be preposterous to allow the pension to pass without protest."

Mr. Fotheringham proposed this synod hereby demand that the pension shall be restored to the former amount, \$480.

"We all believe," he further commented, "that a pension is a debt of honor. Such action as I have related places it as a charity."

"If there are other cases in the diocese of injustice, let each diocese do something in the way of protest, in order that it may be possible to say that Canada is doing her duty honorably and fairly by her soldiers and their dependents."

"Demand" Modified.

On advice of A. H. Backus, Aylmer, who pleaded for moderation, while expressing himself as thoroughly in sympathy with the principle of the resolution, the word "demand" in connection with the restoration of the full amount of the pension, was changed to "urgently request," carrying thereby the resolution, and with a show of feeling somewhat unusual.

Mr. G. Henderson of Windsor, in seconding the resolution, declared that the people of Canada do not want to treat the men or their dependents in a "big game" fashion.

"I can't understand such an act," he said, "and was never more surprised or horrified than when I heard it. It can't find words to express my feelings towards those responsible for it. (Cries of 'hear, hear'. To say that a poor, less woman should be tied down to an income of \$40 a month is outrageous and monstrous."

Rev. C. K. MacMasters of St. Mary's, stated that, as he understood the regulations, pensions for soldiers are determined according to the percentage of disability from which those applying for pensions are suffering. "No other source of income has anything to do with the pension. If this is true in the case of a man, surely it is true in the case of a widow who has lost her son, and is unable to defend herself."

Cases Are Numerous.

Some members of the synod questioned this was not a very rare and exceptional case, some expressing a measure of objection to the possible criticism implied of the Government. To the first, Rev. S. E. McKegney, M. C. of London, replied by wanting to know where these representatives had been in the past few years. "Case after case is coming up in town after town all the time," said Mr. McKegney, "of returned soldiers and widows of soldiers not getting a square deal."

The question of increase of the superannuation allowance to the clergy, qualified by service from \$100 to \$200 per annum was introduced by Rev. Canon Craig in connection with a notice of motion for the revision of the canon on the auxiliary superannuation fund.

The principle of the increase of \$200 per annum to superannuated clergy was approved by the synod, and added to the committee to work out the details for raising the money and report to the synod.

Religion in Schools.

The subject of religious instruction in the public schools was given a place of prominence in the discussion of the afternoon, introduced by the chairman, Rev. G. B. Sage, and by a resolution sent in by the Brant Dean, Dean.

The Brant Rural Deanery's request to the synod, submitted by Rev. R. S. Adamson, rural dean, was as follows:

"That this deanery requests the Synod of Huron to memorialize the Provincial Synod, as follows:

"The Synod of Huron requests that a committee be appointed by the synod, which shall be authorized to invite representatives of other Christian bodies in Ontario to a general conference, with a view to the inclusion of religious instruction as a part of the curriculum of our public schools."

The bishop pointed out that the department of education is not a religious body, and that the inclusion of religious instruction in the curriculum of our public schools is a matter for the government to decide.

Rev. Canon Craig, of St. Thomas, stated that he had been a member of a school board, and that he had seen the results of religious instruction in the curriculum of our public schools.

In conclusion, it was pointed out that, in the forward movement, the church of England has as allies, not only the Episcopal Church of the United States, which has as its forward movement, financial objective the sum of \$20,000 outside of local funds, but also the churches of other communions in Canada, the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational, all uniting in an allied drive to quicken the spiritual life of Canada, raise the moral standard of the citizenship and bring the world to a saving knowledge of Christ.

With reference to the plan of campaign Canon Craig stated that the various synods are being left in larger measure to work out their independent plans of organization.

Publicity to Start.

The general plan of campaign adopted is to begin publicity work at once, to an extent which will introduce the forward movement to every parish before the summer holidays, but to reserve the intensive publicity campaign for the grand canvass. Benefiting by the experience of Victoria League campaigns, the organizers of the forward movement are planning to work up to a climax of interest and enthusiasm in the time for the canvass, and avoid the disastrous effects of anti-climax.
