

BUDGET RESOLUTION PASSES BY MAJORITY OF 50 VOTES

Hon. W. S. Fielding, Former Finance Minister, Flays Sir
Thomas White Because of "Somersault" On
Tariff Issue.

OTTAWA, June 19.—The debate on the budget concluded at 2:30 o'clock this morning, and the speaker put the question. The vote on the amendment was taken first, and fourteen Unionists voted for it. They were as follows: Crozier, Clark, Mahan,

Knox, Davis, Levi Thompson, Reid, Crerar, Maharg, Johnston, Douglas, Buchanan, J. C. Campbell, Fielding, Pardee and MacNutt.

Two Liberals voted with the Government, Messrs. McCrea of Sherbrooke, and Euler of North Waterloo.

For the amendment, 70; against the amendment, 121; Government majority, 51.

A vote was then taken on the main motion.

Messrs. Knox, Maharg, and Douglas, who voted for the amendment, then voted in favor of the budget. No Liberals voted for it.

W. F. Cockshutt, the Brantford Conservative protectionist, voted against the budget, as also did the following Unionists: Crerar, Clark, MacNutt, Thompson, Johnston, Reid, Campbell

The vote stood: For the budget, 120; against the budget, 70; Government majority of 50.

The last figures were announced at 3:15 a.m.

While the concluding speeches were being delivered by Col. James Arthur and Col. Peter F.C., just before the voting, the floor of the chamber was deserted. In the corridors the men were singing, "Pack all your troubles in your old kit bag," while Government white and emissaries were busy making last minute appeals to western men.

SIGNING OF PEACE
