speaking in King Street Presbyterian Church last night.
"We were bamboozled about Russia; we are now being rebamboozled," said Dr. Nelson, who made merry at the expense of newspaper editors, who had so long misrepresented the truth about Russia, and pointed out as one of the greatest reforms the Bolsheviki had undertaken was the making of adverundertaken was the making of advertising a government monopoly, newspapers being forbidden to carry paid advertising. As a result, said Dr. Nelson, journalism was free in Russia. Industries were being operated with a fair percentage for capital invested, and the rest of the profits were divided among the workers. Free use of land was granted the peasants, but no peasant could have more land than he and his own family could till without hiring help.

After referring to the great inventive genius, the wonderful musical and artistic talent of the Rusisans, and their high literary accomplishments, Dr. Nelson asked whether it would be so very strange after all if such people

very strange after all if such people could invent some improvement on government. He briefly explained the soviet system, and quoted from returned factory superintendents and others to show that the Bolsheviki were devotedly honest and fair even to for devotedly honest and fair even to for-

COUNTY ROADS ARE **UNSAFE FOR TRUCKS**

Heavily Laden Motors Liable Farm Buildings At Ontario Hospital To Be Stuck, Says the The fire which swept the west end of the farm buildings at the Ontario

County Engineer.

Hospital for the Insane yesterday Although the country roads all have the appearance of being hard and dry, and dust is flying on all roads throughout the district, they are decidedly unsafe for heavily-laden motor trucks, afternoon, accomplished damages altogether estimated at \$10,000. In addition to the buildings destroyed, a considerable loss was involved in the destruction of all the grain stored over safe for heavily-laden motor trucks, according to Charles Talbot, the county engineer. Many heavy trucks have befrom last season for spring seeding this year. Considerable quantities of hay and straw were in the mows above the cowharns and granaries, and engineer. come stuck in the soft spots on the roads during the past week. It is almost impossible for heavy loads to travel any the cowharns and granaries, and these, too, were destroyed.

In view of the high winds which prevailed the fire department had a difficult task preventing the flames from spreading to the horse barns and two large silos which are close to where the burned buildings stood. The dairy building, cow barn and granaries all stood in line, really forming one long building through which the flames spread quickly. The fire originated either in the granary or a straw mow great distance before coming to grief. A bad spot has been discovered tween this city and Lambeth, where a stretch of road some thirty or forty feet in length and covering the whole width of the road is a veritable bog. The cause is thought to be a broken tile in drain running beneath the roadbed. Because it is impossible for the light-est car to cross the spot, the road has been diverted for some little distance ither in the granary or a straw mo been diverted for some little distance on to the old traction right-of-way. The ties that have been taken up have been used to build a gangway to and from the roadway. The hard bed of the old electric line has made a good sound passageway.
