TORONTONIANS WILL SEE UNIQUE PAINTING

"The Shadow of the Cross," Which is Being Shown for Newsboys Home, is a Mystery.

For the first time Torontonians will on Monday be privileged to view a picture which has been more talked of than any other work of art in the many histories of America, in which it has been exhibited.

"The Shadow of the Cross" is, however, more than a painting, it is a mystery, and one which, at that, has baffled explanation by the leading scientists of Europe and America. The unique feature of the picture is that it is different, according to the circumstances under which it is viewed. In the ordinary light of the studio it is a praise-compelling delineation of the "Man of Sorrows" standing on a rocky eminence in the wilderness of Judea, behind Him the glory of a luminous cloud-shot sky.

But when the studio lights are extinguished, see the transformation that comes over the painting. It is still visible, but now it is by the light which emanates from the canvas itself. As a silhouette figure the majestic form of the Christ stands out with startling distinctness against the sky, which now glows with an almost supernatural radiance, and, strangest of all, there now appears, diagonal behind the figure of the Saviour, the shadow of a cross, stretching across the background of the canvas.

This wonderful painting, which will be on exhibition at Peterson's Art Gallery, 382 Yonge-street, is being shown for the benefit of the building fund of the Newsboys' Home, and the worthiness of the object, combined with the uniqueness of the work of art, should attract thousands, both of clergy and laity, to the gallery.

SURPRISED THAT RIGHT TO FORTIFY QUESTIONED

Britain Acknowledged It by Implication, Say American State and Army Officers.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Officials, both of the state department and of the army, express surprise that any question should be raised at this time as to the right of the United States to erect fortifications along the Panama Canal. They regard the unfavorable comment in the English press on Mr. Roosevelt's remarks about the necessity for fortifying the canal as evidence of a misunderstanding, both of the action of the American Government and of the attitude of the British foreign office itself. American officials hold that the agreement of 1891, known as the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, by implication gave the United States the right to fortify the canal.

In this connection, according to the understanding of the state department, the view of the British Government was expressed in a memorandum by Lord Lansdowne, on August 31, 1901, communicated to Secretary Hay through Lord Pauncefote. "I understand that by the omission of all reference to the matter of defence," said he, "the United States Government desires to reserve the power of taking measures to protect the canal, at any rate when the United States may be at war, from destruction or damage at the hands of an enemy or enemies. I am therefore not prepared to deny that contingencies may arise when, not only from a national point of view, but on behalf of the commercial interests of the whole world, it might be of supreme importance to the United States that they should be free to adopt measures for the defence of one canal at a moment when they were themselves engaged in hostilities."

declared here has been openly acting on the theory that it had the right to fortify the canal. Both President Roosevelt and President Taft asked congress for appropriations to fortify the canal, the latter presenting the question in a special message. As early as 1897, the so-called Taft-board, appointed by Secretary of War Taft, recommended the erection of forts along the canal. At present a joint board of army and navy officers is preparing plans for fortification. By specific provision of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty with Panama in 1904, the right of the United States to fortify the canal was recognized. No protest was entered by Great Britain to that treaty when it was proclaimed, nor since, it is said.

SHOULDN'T GO TOO FAR

Rev. H. A. Macpherson's Reference to Eucharistic Congress.

"We ought to keep rigidly before us the fact that the British nation is absolutely Protestant," said the Rev. H. A. Macpherson, in Chalmers Presbyterian Church, last evening, in referring to the Eucharistic Congress at Montreal. "I do not consider that any church should receive government recognition in a conference of this kind." The words around which Mr. Macpherson gathered his thoughts were taken from I. Samuel, xl, 14, "Let us go to Gilead, and renew the kingdom there." Gilead was a place of very sacred memory to the Jew, and we as Canadians also in our brief history had many places which should continually remind us of the blood that had been shed in defence of a Protestant government.

"In the midst of all these denominational conferences we should remember that Canada is a Protestant country," he continued. "I do not know just exactly how far our government would like to go toward paying homage to the Pope's representatives, but there seems to be a decided tendency toward going just a little past the danger mark."
