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THREE CARDINALS ARE CONSECRATED

Mediaeval Ceremony at Vati-
can Attended With Great
Magnificence.

Rome, March 10.—Secular and ecclesiastical Rome today turned its footsteps and thoughts to the Vatican, where three new cardinals were formally received into the sacred college. This ceremony, one of the few that have come down virtually unchanged through the centuries to the present day, combined the grandeur of the period of Michael Angelo, the pastoral atmosphere that envelops the Holy See and the impressiveness that clings to the sacred rites of St. Peter's. Only three cardinals were consecrated today because the three Spanish prelates elevated to the cardinalate will receive their red hats from King Alfonso.

Archbishops Dennis J. Dougherty of Philadelphia, Josef Schulte of Cologne and Michael von Faulhaber of Munich, who yesterday received the first insignia of their new rank in the hierarchy of the church, took their places today in the ranks of the cardinals and assumed in full the dignities conferred on them by Pope Benedict. Since Monday these prelates have been given flattering attention in the holy city, but today they were the centre about which revolved a pageant which impressed the eyes of a distinguished congregation and will long be remembered.

An Imposing Gathering.
Long before 10 o'clock, the hour for the beginning of the ceremony, Roman citizens, peasants and princes, diplomats and priests, gathered before the great bronze doors of the Sella Regia. When the doors were opened, the throng was admitted to the hall, where distinguished visitors were shown to tribunes and others were given places on the benches arranged about the great room. At the right of the Pope's throne were small boxes reserved for members of the pontiff's family, representatives of royal families and richly uniformed Knights of Malta and Knights of the Holy Sepulchre.

**FIVE GASOLINE TANKS
ARE DESTROYED BY FIRE**

New York, March 10.—Timely and effective fire-fighting today thwarted a repetition of the spectacular and disastrous oil fire that swept thru the Stone and Fleming works of the Standard Oil Company in Brooklyn in September, 1919.

Flames, that for a time threatened to lay waste scores of 25,000 gallon tanks, broke out at 10 o'clock, but before 2 o'clock this afternoon, the preventive measures taken by the fire companies had restricted the fire to five tanks and had stopped its spread.

No official estimate of the damage had been given out by the company late tonight, but the unofficial estimate was \$150,000. Six fire-fighters were seriously burned.

**Remove Insurance Limit
On Mailable Matter**

Ottawa, March 10.—(Can. Press).—Amendments to the postoffice act, which have received first reading in the senate, provide for the establishment of "a system of providing for insurance against loss of mailable matter, and fix an insurance fee, to be prepaid." This clause removes the present limit of \$25 insurance on mail matter. Another clause provides that letters unpaid shall go forward charged with double postage. At present underpaid letters are not forwarded.

**DOG THROTTLED BANDIT
BUT WAS SHOT DEAD**

Chicago, March 10.—Leo, a St. Bernard dog, today gave his life in preventing an attempt to hold up his master's grocery shop.

Three bandits walked into Leonard Malone's store and ordered him to throw up his hands. The dog, watching from a corner, hurled his 150 pounds at one of the robbers, sinking his teeth into the man's throat. The man fled, but the dog fell dead. The robbers escaped, but did not obtain any loot.

ADVANCES ARE MADE TO PALESTINE FARMERS

London, March 10.—Pending the establishment of credit banks in Palestine, the administration has made advances to the farming communities, says a despatch from Jerusalem today.

During the past seven months the administration has advanced 145,000 pounds in agricultural loans and has distributed live stock valued at 12,680 pounds. These advances are to be repaid within three years.

NEW YORK CENTRAL TO REDUCE WAGES

Readjustment Affecting 43,000 Employees to Begin in April.

New York, March 10.—The New York Central Railroad announced today that, beginning April 16, wages of approximately 43,000 employees, in practically all departments, would be reduced. A conference will be held later to agree on the new scale. The date and place of the conference have not yet been decided. The formal order, addressed to employees, coming under 55 official classifications, affects virtually every department of the system between New York and Chicago.

The notification follows closely upon similar notice, addressed to all unskilled laborers, numbering 26,000 workers, which was the subject of a conference between officials and employees' representatives last Tuesday, at which the company proposed lower pay for unskilled labor from 12 to 17 cents per hour to from 40 to 45 cents. The wage reductions proposed for unskilled labor, which the employees' representatives took under consideration with the promise of answering at a second conference to be held April 22, amount from 17½ to 21 per cent.

The second and more sweeping notification gives no percentage of reduction proposed, and inasmuch as it covers workers in widely different activities, the reductions proposed will be variable, but probably based upon the increases in pay granted by the United States railway board decision, No. 2, made July 29, 1920.

It was understood that the subsidiary lines, forming a system which employs 174,000 men, soon would follow the lead of the parent organization. The subsidiary companies include the Boston and Albany, Michigan Central, Big Four, Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, Lake Erie and Western, Ohio Central, Zanesville and Western, Kanawha and Michigan, Kanawha and West Virginia, and the Indiana Harbor Belt Railroads.

Eighty-five classifications of employees will be affected by the reductions, and most of these men are members of one or another of the national labor organizations, the company announced.

SUSPENDS LAWS PROTECTING SEALS

Newfoundland Government
Takes Into Account Small
Catches of Two Seasons.

St. John's, Nfld., March 10.—All legal restrictions for the protection of seals have been removed from the operations of the Newfoundland sealing fleet, which sailed from here today on its annual hunt. Because the catch of the last two seasons was the smallest on record, the government decided to suspend for this year the protective laws designed to prevent too serious depletion of the seal herds.

The open season, legally from March 14 to April 20, is extended to May 1, with permission to take any seals found before March 14. Gups may be used to kill seals in the water, and a second trip may be made to the sealing fields. It had been planned to use an airplane to scout for seal herds, but the plane met with a mishap which prevented its use.
