POSSIBILITY OF EARLY AGREEMENT WITH JAPAN ON EXPORT OF URANIUM AND NUCLEAR REACTORS

Mr. James Gillies (Don Valley): Mr. Speaker, my questions are for the minister of external affairs. I should like to commence by thanking the minister for agreeing to postpone his statement on nuclear safeguards in general at the specific request of our party; I appreciate that very much. There are one or two matters I should like to raise which may perhaps be pertinent because of their timing.

First of all, I understand the minister is against starting negotiations with Japan, and I would like to ask him whether it is probable that Canada will reach some understanding with Japan about nuclear exports of uranium and reactors, either formally or informally, before the Group of Seven report promised after the summit meetings in London comes down?
