The annual budgets of the athletic interests of the universities conspicuous in rivalry, are both interesting and impressive.

The budget of Harvard and Pennsylvania or Wisconsin would show the same sort of outlay in kind, and furnish similar ground for generalization.

The total receipts for the past year were \$106,396.66, and the total outlay was \$75,174.43, leaving a net surplus of \$31,222.23.
