SAYS HE CAME FROM ST. JOHN

Portland, Me., Nov. 23.—(Special)—Norman E. Gray, who gives his residence as St. John, and the age as nineteen, and Nettie Knezer, about the same age and living in Bangor, are under arrest here, charged with stealing from Frank R. McDunnah, a Maine workman, \$90 in money, a gold watch, a coat, a vest and a compass, all of the value of \$103. McDunnah came to Portland with the girl from Rumford (Me.), on Monday last. He says that she put her trunk in the room he occupied that yesterday Gray called and was introduced by her as her brother. Gray brought what purported to be a message from the girl's relatives, to the effect that some of them were ill, and advised her to go to them. Later a man named John Bellevue, also calling from New Brunswick, called at the room and took McDunnah out for a walk. When they returned they found the girl's trunk and other articles taken from McDunnah's trunk. The loss was reported to the police at once, and search was made for Gray and the girl. They were found to have gone to two boarding houses, and at the second both were arrested. They denied all knowledge of the money, but the clothing was found in the girl's trunk. She said McDunnah put it there, because he did not have room in his own trunk, but he denied this. Bellevue told the police that Gray and the woman asked him to take the money from McDunnah, and when he refused they got him to take McDunnah out for a walk. Bellevue was held as a witness. The woman was mixed up here in a similar game a few months ago, but there was not sufficient evidence then to hold her, and she was allowed to go on condition of leaving the city.

SOLDIERS LEAVE TODAY.

Halifax, Nov. 23.—(Special)—The Dominion liner Kensington arrived from Montreal this evening and the embarkation of troops will take place tomorrow morning. The troops going include the R. G. A., R. G. R., R. A. M. C., and school staff. Headquarters staff remains, and there will be about 200 imperial troops in garrison, consisting of R. E. and different staffs. The embarkation of the R. G. A. and R. G. R. troops leaves Halifax practically in the hands of the Canadian militia department, though, of course, Major-General Charles Parsons is still in command.

Mr. Tweedie, when asked concerning military drill in the schools, said that he had no very bad conference with Sir Frederick Borden upon the matter, but that the matter would be taken up at the next meeting of the local government.

THE SEAMY SIDE OF LIFE

Case of Murder and Suicide Revealed in Maine Woods—Body of Albany Woman Found Bound in a Trunk.

Clermont, N. H., Nov. 23.—A case of murder and suicide revealed today, when the bodies of a man and a woman were found in a trunk in the woods near a Maine railroad track in West Clermont. Clipped in the man's right hand was a 32 calibre revolver with all but one of the five chambers empty. The bodies were recognized as those of a couple who register at the Jersey House at W. H. Leavitt and wife, of Portland (Me.), who left the following day. In the man's pockets were found papers bearing the name of Harry W. Leavitt, and W. H. Leavitt, and a letter addressed to Mrs. Mary J. Leavitt, Lisbon Falls (Me.). The medical man who expressed the opinion that the couple had been dead about two weeks. A further examination by the medical referee showed that the woman had been shot in three places. One bullet entering the head in front of the right ear, per- forated the brain, lodging in the jaw. The second proceeded through her chest. The third, and as Dr. Saunders believes, fatally, entered her right temple. Inside the wedding ring on the woman's finger were the engraved letters "W. H. L. to A. B. W., June 2, 1903." This tended to strengthen the theory of the author- ity that the man was Wm. Harry Leavitt and the woman was his wife. The letter to the proprietor of the Junction House was as follows: "Any money, etc., please forward to Mrs. Mary Leavitt, Lisbon Falls (Me.). Myself and wife have loved, lived together, and now decide to die together; not to name, but just tired of life. Good-bye to all." The bodies were found in a trunk here from Guilford, where it is supposed they were seeking employment in a woolen mill. The Knights of Pythias local lodge will take charge of the bodies, Albany, N. Y., Nov. 23.—What appears to be a murder committed nearly two weeks ago and probably ghastly in its details, was discovered here late this afternoon when the body decomposed body of Mrs. John Hammond was found wedged in a trunk in a room of the house on South Ferry street, where she lived, with her husband. The trunk closed in the first place. The body within, was heavily sprinkled with chloride of lime, and the trunk was found with the door open, the three rooms comprising the first cover of the trunk was propped open with the evident idea of preventing the discovery of the bodies. The body of Mrs. Hammond, the woman's husband, has not been seen for nearly two weeks. He is twenty-five years old, a cabinet-maker and came from Cohasset. The dead woman was fifty-seven. Whether the woman died a natural death, was strangled or was poisoned remains for an autopsy to disclose. There are no evident marks of violence on the body which, when found, was fully clothed, excepting shoes and was doubled up in a sitting posture with her face down upon the knees. The body was bound in this position with a dothesline. Disagreeable odors all day today drew the attention of the first floor family to the Hammond rooms from which not a sound has been heard for at least ten days and after the police broke in and discovered the body. A picture of Hammond was found by the police and his description has been known.
