Fire in Boarding House at Niagara

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 15.—(Special)—Twelve foreigners, all workmen on the Canadian power development, were burned to death early this morning, while eight others were seriously burned, and some of them may die.

LONDON TIMES SUGGESTS THAT KING HOLD COURT IN CAPITAL CITIES OF HIS DOMINIONS

Sees Conspicuously Beneficent Effect On the Empire

NEW IMPERIAL IDEA

Expansion of Accepted View of Royal Activity Might Well Be Called For—Noble to Sail at End of July—Botha Defines Policy

Times's Special Cable. London, June 15.—The Times says it is hardly open to doubt if it were found possible for the king to hold courts in the capital cities of his various dominions, the effect upon the unity and solidarity of the empire would be conspicuously beneficent.

The designation of the Duke of Connaught as governor-general of Canada, although not directly determined by a conscious adoption of this expanded view of the place of monarchy in the empire, does undoubtedly operate in that direction.

It is perhaps all the more valuable as an indication of the probable trend of events just because it comes about in the ordinary course without definite intention to open up a new imperial epoch.

Lord Milner, speaking at the Royal Colonial Institute said the strenuous imperial unity among younger men in political life gave the greatest hope for the future of the movement.

London, June 14.—In announcing the second reading of the census bill, Hon. John Burt said that communications were occurring with the colonies with a view to the institution of an imperial census on approximately the same lines throughout the empire simultaneously.

Duke of Connaught, who opens the South African parliament in November next, after the ceremony will tour South Africa.

Commenting on the suggestion that the king should open the imperial conference in 1911, the Morning Post says the proposal accords with the present tendency of imperial thought and events.

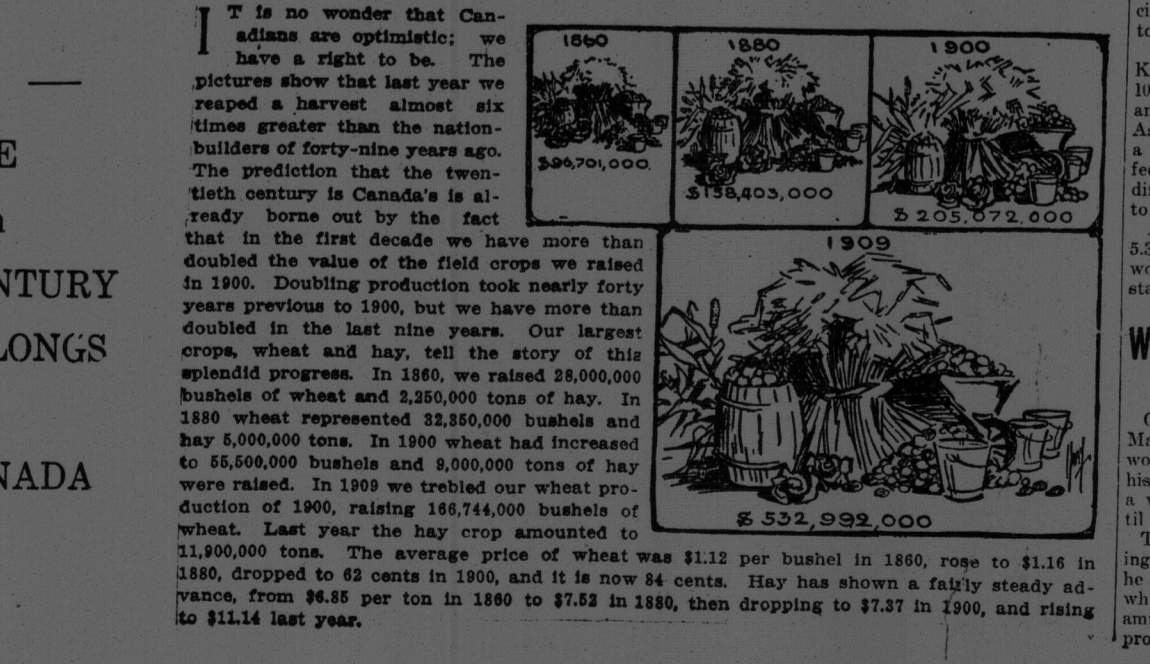
