FELICITATIONS AND FLOWERS FOR ROYAL BABY

Speculation Rife As To
Name For Duchess'
Child

HAS EYES OF BLUE

Physicians Report Her Healthy
and Weighing More Than
Seven Pounds

LONDON, April 22.—Number 17 Bruton street, Mayfair, today, as yesterday, was the centre of attraction for baby-worshipping women and girls, who crowded to the spot, to view the house in which Great Britain's newest princess was born early yesterday morning to the Duke and Duchess of York. At all social gatherings last night the toast was "The New Baby Princess."

Speculation is rife as to what name will be chosen for the princess. Among the most popular in the minds of the public are Elizabeth, Mary and Victoria. Elizabeth makes a strong appeal to the popular imagination because of the possibility of the little newcomer some day ascending the throne, thus giving Britain another "Good Queen Bess" and another Elizabethan era.

HER EYES ARE BLUE.
A vital question regarding the princess, from woman's viewpoint is what is the color of the baby's eyes. This has been answered by those who profess to know. They assert that the eyes are blue. They also declare that the princess weighed more than seven pounds on her arrival. The physicians in attendance report her strong and healthy, and as having a quantity of hair.

The christening of the infant is expected to take place in the Chapel Royal at St. James' Palace. The godfathers will be King George and the Prince of Wales, while the two grandmothers, Queen Mary and the Countess of Strathmore, will be godmothers. Nothing concerning the christening, however, has been officially announced.

GRANDPARENTS PLEASED.
King George and Queen Mary and Queen Maund of Norway had a peep at the little girl yesterday afternoon and are declared to have expressed much pride in her. The Royal grandparents had been up since an early morning hour, when they were informed of the new arrival.

Throughout the day messages of congratulation from all parts of the empire arrived at the mansion of the Earl of Strathmore where the baby was born, for the Duke and Duchess of York. The endless stream of messengers so taxed the front door bell that late in the afternoon it was put out of commission. Electricians were called in and their efforts to fix the bell gave the crowds outside cause for much amusement.

In addition to messages of felicitation, flowers in large quantities were sent to the mansion and before nightfall, the rooms were filled. Masses of tulips, roses and carnations were brought or sent by exalted relatives and friends and numerous sheaves of affidavits came from humbler folk.

In Parliament Today

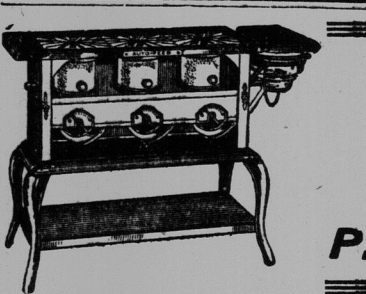

COUP D'ETAT DENIED

Warsaw Announces Polish Cabinet Resigns But Remains in Power

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—The Polish legation last night made public the following cablegram from Warsaw: "The Polish Telegraphic Agency is authorized to state that rumors which have been spread today from Berlin to the press, of an alleged coup d'etat in Warsaw and an alleged proclamation that a Fascist government would be established are devoid of all foundation. The Skrzynski cabinet sent in its resignation today. However, it was not accepted by the president of the republic, the consequence of which is that the cabinet remains in power for the time being."



AGENTS' GENERAL INTERVIEW LARKIN

Suggest Increased Representation of Canadian Provinces in London

LONDON, April 22.—Increased representation of the Canadian provinces in London is believed by the various provincial agents-general here to be advisable, and they submitted their views on the matter today to Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London.

The deputation suggested that the High Commissioner should use his influence towards the appointment of an additional agent-general to jointly represent the three prairie provinces, which now possess no direct representation. It was also suggested that New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island might secure the services of the Nova Scotia Agent-General to represent them in addition to his present duties.

These propositions were, of course, entirely with the provinces concerned for them to divide themselves, the deputation admitted, but were regarded as very desirable.

Heliograph Inventor Passes Away At Oxford

LONDON, April 22.—Sir Henry Mance, inventor of the heliograph, a system of utilizing the sun's rays for telegraphic signals, used extensively by explorers and surveyors, died today at Oxford.

Sumatran Natives Wax Rich On Rubber Boom

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Natives of Sumatra are becoming so rich as a result of high rubber prices that they commonly wear American ten and twenty dollar gold pieces as ornaments. Lieut. H. C. Kellers, a member of the U. S. Naval Expedition which went to the East Indies to observe the total eclipse of the sun reported on his return. One jewelry store displayed American gold pieces to the value of \$20,000.

BRITAIN READY TO TALK IMMIGRATION

Nations League Labor Office Seeks Conference on Inspection Aboard Ship

GENEVA, April 22.—The International labor office of the League of Nations has issued a report of the replies received from the movements in regard to the international agreement on simplification of the inspection of emigrants aboard ship, which will be discussed at the coming session of the International Labor Conference, opening on May 26.

BRITAIN READY
The British reply states that the government is of the opinion that it is at present impracticable and undesirable to deal with the matter by international convention, but if a suitable one can be framed, the government would not object to recommendation which would simplify the supervision of emigrants aboard ship, provided nothing contained in the recommendation detracted in any way from control over the ship by the government whose flag the ship flies, or from the authority of the master of the ship.
