New York, April 12.—Oxford University's relay runners will sail for this country next Saturday, according to word received here. Captain Milligan and his men are expected to arrive in this city the following Friday and will proceed to Philadelphia where they will take part in the relay carnival of the University of Pennsylvania to be held on Franklin Field on April 27 and 28.

MOOSE KILLED.

(Halifax Chronicle) One of the country newspapers which have reported the indiscriminate slaughter of big game in Nova Scotia during the present winter, which should not be allowed to go without notice and action on the part of the provincial game authorities.

It is in effect charged by this writer that moose have been killed on a wholesale scale and in a systematic way for commercial purposes. Similar charges have appeared in some of the country newspapers which have printed reports that concerns engaged in lumbering operations have been receiving their meat supply during the winter from poachers, who have carried on a steady warfare against the moose in flagrant and wanton violation of the law and have been profiting at the expense of the game resources of the Province. It has been stated that owing to the heavy snowfall the moose have been trapped in their yards, and owing to their inability to escape on account of the snow have fallen an easy prey to poachers. We do not know how well founded these allegations are. It may be the charges are exaggerated, but in any event they are serious enough to demand investigation, and if violations have occurred in this wholesale way, prompt action should be taken to bring the offenders to justice.

AXE EDITOR TO BE FREED.

Quebec, April 12.—An order in council for the liberation of John H. Roberts from the Quebec jail, where he is serving a sentence of one year imposed upon him by the Quebec Legislature, was drawn up by the provincial cabinet yesterday. When it is sanctioned by the Lieutenant-Governor today, Roberts will be a free man.
