Former St. John Newspaper Man Writes of Destruction it is Causing in Parts of Kings County—A River Trip

It was a perfectly delightful afternoon, and all along were seen evidence that the people were enjoying it. Near Westfield two young men in a small canoe went dancing over the waves, and swung around to cross first the wake of the Purdy coming down, and then that of the Champlain going up. It was a neat bit of work, and there were some of the steamer who envied the young men the exhibition of the moment. Clad in bathing suits, the canoeists were ready for any eventuality. A little farther up two ladies were seen in a canoe, while row boats and motor boats were also out on the surface of the stream.

WALTER HIGGINS OF ST. JOHN DIES IN AMHERST

Many friends in the city will regret to hear of the death of Walter Higgins, son of Mrs. Mary and the late Thomas Higgins of Little River, which occurred this morning in Amherst, St. John.

Mr. Higgins was born in Amherst, St. John, on the 10th of August, 1887, and was not thought that his illness was very serious and the news of his death came as a great shock to his friends, and especially to his immediate relatives.

For some time he had been a resident of Amherst, where he was well and favorably known. He was a young man of a very kind and genial disposition and endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact. He was a faithful member of the St. Charles Catholic church, and was a great help to his friends, and coming as it did suddenly, cast a great gloom over his friends here and throughout the province. While his illness had extended since Easter, it was not until Sunday last that his case was considered serious. Father Brown and his sisters, Miss Bertha and Mrs. Jas. W. Leonard, were at his bedside when he died peacefully. His body rested in the St. Charles church awaiting the arrival of the No. 2 train for St. John. Then a lengthy procession accompanied the body to the station.

Mr. Higgins is survived by his mother, two sisters—Mrs. James Gallagher, of Norton, and Mrs. Elizabeth, of the city, and three brothers, Herbert, of the railway mail service, and Leonard and Frederick of the city. The body will be brought to the city on the train at 9:30 o'clock this evening.
