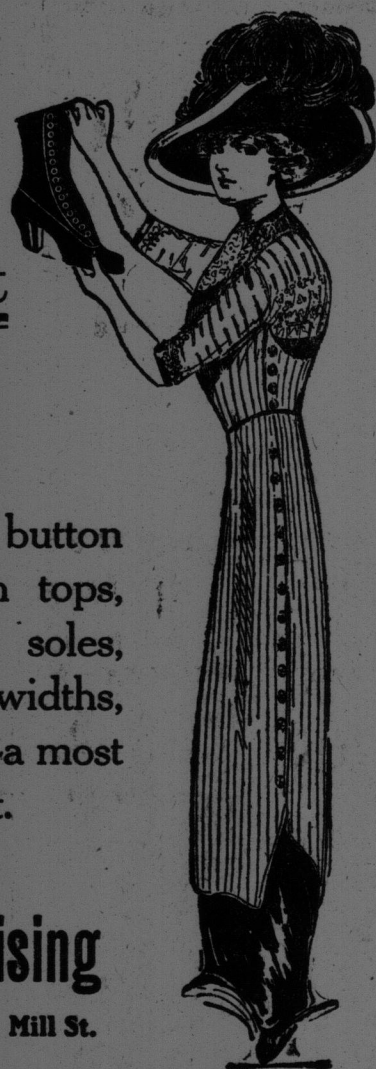

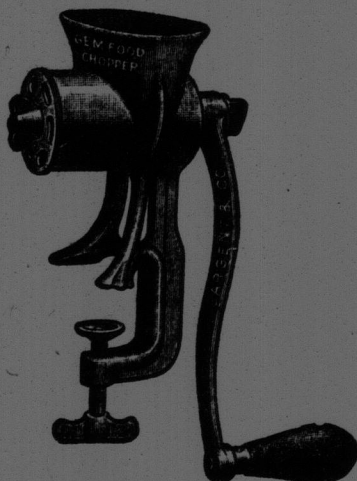

Lumbering Near Salisbury

Chip McFarlane, of Lewis Mountain, Salisbury, expects to carry on a lumber operation on a large scale at Indian Mountain this winter. Mr. McFarlane has bought up the David Rogers' lumber area and will move his portable mill, which has been cutting all summer at South Bay, Saint John, to this lumber chance. The sawn lumber will be hauled from the mill to Catamount siding on the Northern I. C. R. above Berry's Mills, and shipped to Saint John by rail. This big lumber operation at the Mountain this winter will give employment to a large number of men and teams.

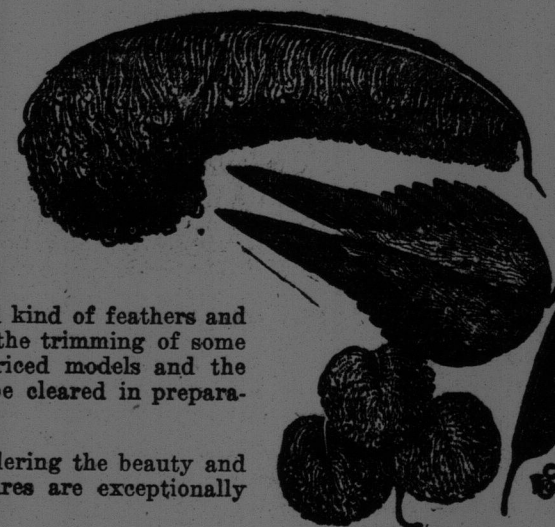

MADE BIG PROFITS IN ART SALES TO SENATOR CLARK

Sir George Donaldson, in Suit, Tells of Picture Bought For \$30,000 and Sold For \$75,000 — \$2,000 One Brought \$25,000

London, Nov. 6.—The great profits made by art dealers from American purchasers were exposed in the testimony given today in the suit brought against Sir George Donaldson, by Alfred G. Temple, the art expert, for commission in connection with the sale of a collection of old masters to ex-United States Senator William A. Clark for \$40,000. Judgment was given to Mr. Temple for \$27,000 and the Lord Chief Justice, who tried the suit, awarded him another \$2,700 as recompense for the detention of the money by Sir George Donaldson since 1909, when the last deal took place with Mr. Clark.

In the course of cross examination Sir George Donaldson testified that he had made a big profit from Mr. Clark. He said he had bought a picture by Turner for \$20,000 and had sold it for \$75,000 and he had acquired a seascape by Jan Van Goyen for \$2,000 and had sold it for \$25,000.

FINE MID-WEEK BILL AT THE GEM

Those who attended the Gem Theatre yesterday now understand fully the meaning of the phrase "A Man Hunt." Much has been written concerning this most awful of ordeals, this organized trailing of a man who is generally wanted for some criminal action, but few really appreciate the utter significance of the term, nor can they do so unless they were to witness the harrowing grill in question. At the Gem yesterday, however, the feature of the programme was a two reel production entitled "The Man Hunt," in which the factors which compose an organized search by worthy citizens for a criminal were cleverly displayed, and interwoven with a tender story of love and pathos which lent charm to the narrative and added to the general interest. A Bit of Railroad History
St. Andrews Beacon.—Addressing a teachers' conference in Toronto recently, W. J. Thompson outlined the historical development of railway construction in Canada. Among other things he said was that an attempt was made in 1827, two years after Stephenson completed the first

railway in England, to construct a railway between St. Andrews, N. B., and Quebec, but the project was dropped. Mr. Thompson was not very accurate in his figures. The minute-book of the "Transactions of the St. Andrews and Quebec Railroad Association," which we have access to, shows that the first meeting in furtherance of

this object was held in St. Andrews on October 5, 1835. Right of way had been surveyed as far as the international boundary, and fourteen miles of track laid from St. Andrews before the international difficulties intervened and compelled the stoppage of the work. This was several years after the project had been mooted.

Boxes are best for verbenas, heliotrope lobelia, ageratum, alysium, &c., which all need a frost-proof structure later on, but are best rooted in a cold frame. Keep the frames close during the day, air at night, and prevent flagging by spraying on bright days, and having the sashes whitewashed till roots are formed.
