UP TO MR. BORDEN Mr. Borden has no mandate from the people to send thirty-five million dollars out of this country as the first instalment of a policy of tribute. The senate will tell him to get the consent of the people before carrying out a policy which was not adopted in the interests of Canada and the Empire, but because of an alliance made between Mr. Borden and the Nationalists. It is the boast of Mr. Henry Bourassa that the Nationalists forced Mr. Borden to repudiate the Canadian navy resolution which he supported in 1909.

What is the cause of the delay in constructing the bridge at the falls? It was expected that this work would be begun early in the spring. A downward revision of the tariff and a Canadian navy ought to be two great planks in a Liberal platform to be placed before the country.

Mr. MacLean showed in parliament yesterday that the percentage of rural population to the total population of Canada has fallen from 62 per cent to 54 per cent in ten years. Here is a problem for statesmanship. One way of meeting the changed conditions would be to increase the productivity of the farms.

REDUCE THE TARIFF That instead of piling up such an enormous surplus as that of last year, the tariff, is the reasonable claim of the Liberal party, voiced in parliament yesterday by Hon. A. K. MacLean in his criticism of the budget speech.

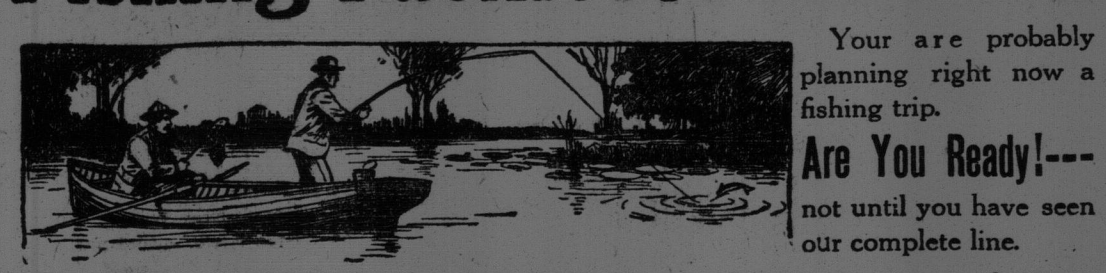
