POSTAL BANK SUCCESS

In Eleven Months Deposits in New York Reach \$724,432

New York, Sept. 13.—The Postal Savings Bank has been a great success in the first year of its existence. So successful has it been that branches have been established about the borough at the various carrier stations until the system is now made up of twenty-two parts, each of which is thriving. The last three new branches were opened one month ago.

Monday was the first anniversary of the establishment of the first branch, the central branch at the post office building in Washington street. On the first day 130 men, women and children opened accounts and deposited together the sum of \$2,335. On Friday Postmaster E. W. Voorhies furnished the figures of the bank's transactions for the first eleven months of its existence. At the end of the period, August 1, Brooklyn stood seventh in the list of cities in which the banks had been established. It had then on deposit the sum of \$699,563. The number of depositors was 8,774.

The people who have benefited by the bank are those who can deposit only small amounts and who must be able to withdraw their money as they need it, a necessity not contemplated by the rules laid down by the savings banks. In consequence of this condition the withdrawals have been enormous in comparison with the deposits. In the eleven months there were 12,243 withdrawals of sums ranging from \$1 to \$500. The aggregate amount taken out in the eleven months was \$234,589, while the entire amount deposited in the period was \$724,432. In other words the withdrawals amounted to about 33 per cent of the deposits.

NEW OIL FUEL SHIP

MAKES GOOD RECORD

The Christian X Burns 710 Tons of Crude Petroleum From Hamburg to New Orleans

The first of the Hamburg-American line's new oil burning vessels to arrive at New Orleans was the Christian X, which reached that port last week from Hamburg after a successful voyage. The Christian X is of the new "stackless" type, equipped with Diesel engines, using a low grade of petroleum oil. The driving machinery, which is extremely compact, does away with cumbersome coal bunkers, the necessity of many stokers and the delay of coaling.

The Christian X left Hamburg on July 22, and on her first day, with good weather made an average of 11 1/2 nautical miles an hour. Later, under heavy weather and storm conditions, her general average for the trip was 11.01 nautical miles an hour. She spent four days in port at Havana and eight at Vera Cruz, and consumed 710 tons of oil. This is a creditable record for a vessel of this size driven by oil engines.

The exhaust gases, after being cooled, pass out 40 feet above the deck through the funnels, which is hollow.

AUSTRALIA'S BID FOR MEN

Canada Being Outdistanced by Hard Work and Expenditure of Money in the Fight for British Emigrants

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, Sept. 13.—Arguments designed to show that the fumes recently made about Australian emigration is unequal for that it is due to the statistical artistry of Australian compilers of blue books and that there is really nothing in it, are now frequent.

It is difficult to understand why these arguments are advanced. The cold fact is that while British emigrants to Canada were nearly 6,000 fewer in July than in June, Australia's numbers increased by about 3,500.

Add to this the facts that two extra Norddeutscher Lloyd boats are full up, that the "Aberdeen" and other lines have augmented their services, that even with this increased accommodation berths cannot be secured before December and you begin to grasp the force of the work of the Commonwealth.

As a matter of fact Australia is building up an organization superior to that of Canada and, given a continuation of this condition, it is only a question of time before Canada will take second place.

Experts in these matters will tell you that Australia is putting down two to one, and it is money that counts.

Schoolboy Humor

A number of good stories are on record representing the strange mixture of knowledge displayed by schoolboys under examination. But one of the latest, which appears in the Windsor Magazine, is one of the best, not for any great show of ignorance, but more as an illustration of the strange confusion of ideas brought about in the youthful mind by "a little knowledge."

The schoolboy had to write an essay on "Grass," and he wrote:—"Grass comes up in the spring. Grass is the only thing left which has not been initiated in trimmings for bonnets. STATE PROJECTS TO INCREASE BIRTH RATE

Lloyd George Has Precedents in Many Countries in His Present Plan

London, Sept. 13.—In 1801, the French parliament had before it a bill proposing to divide the whole nation into five classes. In the first were to be the parents of ten children, who were to be honored by wearing a tri-color ribbon in their hats. On the other hand bachelors were to suffer for them public meetings, and he was to be allowed to dispose of property at death; he was not to be permitted to leave his wife and children, and he was to be compelled to wear a green-and-yellow cockade in his hat whenever he went along the streets!

Germany, too, had the trouble long ago, and curious measures were put forth to increase the birth rate. A motion was introduced to make unmarried men pay so many taxes that it would be impossible for them to live in the state. Another suggestion was that half the income of childless couples should be taken from them, and that they should be forced to dress in official costume of a drab-brown hue, which would make them the scorn and scoff of all other people!

Germany proposed that all married folk who had more than eight children should live with payment of but a third of the ordinary taxes, while, if a courageous husband and wife managed to have more than a dozen children, they were to have a house provided by the municipality free of all rent and rates.

That famous ruler of France, the Grand Monarch, went even further than this in his efforts to mitigate the much-declining birthrate of his time. From an edict issued at Tournay it is found that the state actually offered very decent pensions to parents. Fathers of ten children were to be exempt from all taxes and rates whatever, if each man belonged to the peasant class; if they belonged to the aristocratic class they were to receive a yearly pension of \$5,000. Should parents of this class have a dozen children they were to be given \$10,000, as an annual gift from the state for life!

Sweden long ago had to face a similar problem. Her rulers found that if the birth-rate did not materially improve, before many more years things would be so serious that the little nation would be in danger of being overwhelmed by fierce rivals and surrounding foes who had long wanted the Baltic coast as their own. So Sweden offered many advantages to parents who had a certain number of little ones; and her benefits were arranged in a regular scale, increasing by something like a geometrical progression in value, after the lowest limit of six children was passed.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Lloyd George, has, then, many good old examples to work from in his present attempt to improve the birthrate of these islands. The Kaiser is equally anxious and keen in Germany today for a similar tendency is manifesting itself strongly there with respect to the declining number of births.

The Holy Father has sent to Prince Leopold, Duke of Brabant and son of the King of Belgium, a magnificent silver crucifix. The souvenir was presented to the prince by his eminence Cardinal Mercier, Archbishop of Malines.
