Cobourg Printing House Employee Rescued From Perilous Position in Which Robber Placed Him

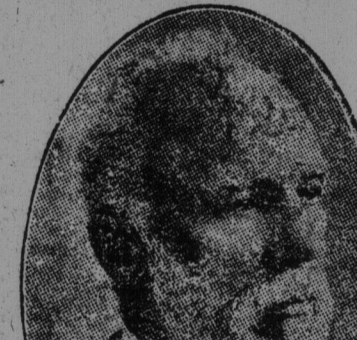

WOMAN DRIVES AUTO AT 109 MILES AN HOUR

Half Mile in 16 1-2 Seconds, Lightning Speed of Run by Mrs. Cuneo of Long Island

(Canadian Press) New York, April 18.—A speed never attained before, it is believed, was made by Mrs. John Newton Cuneo, of Richmond, Long Island, yesterday afternoon at the Long Island Motor Parkway. Driving the Louis Dubrov's record smashing car, she swept down a half mile straightaway course first in seventeen and then in 16 1/2 seconds at the rate of 109 miles an hour.

ATTACK TODAY ON JUAREZ

ICE GRIP IS ABOUT LOST

River Likely Open in Day or Two—Majestic Trip Planned for Thursday

It was known that the river would be clear by tomorrow night if the fine weather continued, and if a rain and wind storm arose, it would be certain to clear the ice.

OCEAN TRUST TO FIGHT UNCLE SAM

Contest Right to Sue Steamship Companies for Violation of the Sherman Law

New York, April 18.—(Canadian Press)—The right of the United States government to trans-Atlantic steamship lines for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law is questioned in demurrers filed by ten of the correspondents of the New York Times. The demurrers are identical. They were filed by the Societe Anonyme de Navigation Belge-Americaine, British and North American Steamship Navigation Co. Ltd., Holland-American line, International Navigation Co. Ltd., Anchor Line Ltd., Adrian Gips, Philip A. S. Franklin and William Govey.
