> Lesson No. 176. POINTS TO REMEMBER

REMEMBER THAT:

Detector tubes vary, even those of the same make in the values of place potential necessary for good operation and it is often necessary to adjust the grid leak to fit the particular detector tube in use.

If satisfactory regeneration is not obtained with the receiving set you have built it may be necessary to reverse the connections to the tickler coil.
