TABLET NORTH END UNVEILED

Honor Is Paid to Memory of
Mrs. Margaret
Bailey

Rev. R. S. Crisp Pronounces
Eulogy of Prominent
for Community Good.

This afternoon in the Public Library, Union Hall, North End, a tablet was unveiled to the memory of Mrs. Margaret A. Bailey, founder of the hall and many good works in the North End of the city. The room was filled with interested people. Mrs. Bailey's time and still holds that office, gave a short sketch of the work accomplished by Mrs. Bailey. Mrs. H. Deemer, president of the North End W. C. T. U., who presented the tablet, told of the work being carried on by many who never knew Mrs. Bailey, but who were inspired to noble effort because of her influence.

THE UNVEILING
Miss Margaret Jordan, her granddaughter and namesake, unveiled the tablet to the glory of God and to the memory of my great grandmother, Margaret A. Bailey. Miss Harriet Roberts, another great-granddaughter, spoke words of appreciation for the family, many of whom were present, representing three generations. She thanked the W. C. T. U. for their gift and the people for attending.

The inscription on the tablet is as follows:
"Margaret A. Bailey, beloved of all for her good works and deeds of kindness. Born at Saint John, May 24, 1820. Died April 22, 1911. Promoter of this Union Hall, Portland Public Library and Riverview Memorial Park.
"What doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God."
"Directed by the members of the W. C. T. U. (North End), 1925."

The hymns "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" and "Nearer, My God, to Thee" were sung. Rev. R. S. Crisp offered prayer and Mrs. H. White assisted in the devotion. Mrs. Stanley Harrison sang with the expression "O Rest in the Lord." The Douglas Memorial ceremony. Miss Mary Kirkpatrick played for Mrs. Harrison and Mrs. William McEachern for Mrs. Bailey.

TRIBUTE PAID.
In the course of this address, Rev. Mr. Crisp said: "We meet here today to honor the memory of a woman who combined two qualities that do not always go together—a sympathetic nature and a strong public spirit. To these Mrs. Bailey added an active and untiring energy. As I speak I can almost imagine that I see her now with the plain black bonnet, with one string over her left shoulder, prepared to face any wind or difficulty.
"Men and women who are easily daunted are not much good in this world, and Mrs. Bailey left behind lasting proofs of her public spirit and intense earnest nature. She was not easily daunted. When her mind was set on the accomplishment of any good purpose, she gave her energies in a manner that should be an example to us all. She had done what she could, it is a quotation that comes to my mind as I speak.
"She often attempted undertakings in the face of opposition that would have discouraged any ordinary person. She persevered to the last degree. Having the respect of all who knew her, she had one great asset, whatever other viewpoint her opponents might have."

FOR EMULATION.
"I feel that in naming the park which she promoted, that it should have the addition of her name and be called 'Bailey Riverview Memorial Park.' The name of such a woman should be attached to the work in which she was so much interested. Her example is worthy to be carried on by her children and their children."

ADDRESS READ
Mrs. Alice G. Eagles, who was closely associated with Mrs. Bailey read an address of appreciation for her work on behalf of the North End W. C. T. U. as follows:
"The North End W. C. T. U. desires to pay a tribute to the life of one of its former members, Mrs. Margaret Bailey, who entered the Riverview Memorial Park in April 22, 1911. She was beloved and honored by the W. C. T. U. and by the whole community. She was high esteem in quiet ways, by her philanthropic work in this part of the city.
"Her retiring disposition made the unseen kindnesses her great joy. She had the wonderful knack of helping others to help themselves. The tablet work is one of our best works, maintaining what Mrs. Bailey established. Though it is her memory is kept alive by the spirit of our union in the earnest, quiet work of its members.
"When the wave of the temperance crusade reached Saint John in the late twenties, she was one of the most enthusiastic of its followers. With a band of kindred spirits, she planned and had erected the Union Hall home for the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the Free Public Library and for years an industrial school all under its roof.
"When she was nearing her 80th year, she planned a wayward fountain at the entrance of Riverview Park, Douglas avenue, for thirty travelers and for animals. This work of mercy was taken up by the W. C. T. U. and soon expanded into a monument for our fallen heroes in the South African war and the purchase of the land for the park, Riverview Park.
"Possessed of wonderful ability and a strong will, she gave her whole time to the work of establishing the Riverview Park, which will be her greatest monument. When the union members began to feel the strain of increasing years and the decrease of revenue, the direction of the park was placed in the hands of a directorate of business men and interested friends in the North End. Mrs. Bailey, though nearing 90 years of age, still pursued her work for the park, which she continued until her death at the age of 91.
"The vacant seat in our union made by her death, has never been filled. In the words of our Master, 'She did what she could. We as her fellow workers still mourn her loss.'"
