BRASIL.

President Fonseca Says He Will Resign. President Fonseca, of Brazil, has announced to the press that he will resign.

By TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. London, Nov. 19.—A despatch from Rio Janeiro, this morning states that Fonseca, President of the New Ministry, has formally announced to the press that he will resign.

Fonseca expresses the supreme executive authority that the country shall have definitely decided upon a new government. Meanwhile the ordinary functions of this administration will continue to be performed.

A despatch of yesterday had a reassuring effect in financial circles—Brazilian securities in the London stock exchange today recovered much of the ground lost yesterday and are quoted from 2 to 3 points higher than last night's closing prices.

The feeling prevails that the change of government will not injuriously affect Brazilian finance in the regions.

London, Nov. 19.—Sir James Ferguson in speaking of the situation in Brazil, says that a form of government which is responsible to British creditors for fifty million pounds, has been broken up by British trade with Brazil represented by £1,000,000 worth of country stock, £20,000,000 worth of English manufactured cotton per annum.

HALFAX, N. S., Nov. 19.—A cab drove up to a respectable boarding house on the St. John's District yesterday, and two women entered the house and enquired for the proprietress. They were shown into the parlor and the proprietress, who was immediately after arrived in the room.

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STATE CLOSES.

DEFENCE OPENS. JUBILEE IN THE COIN TRIAL IMPRESSED BY THE TESTIMONY.

Consent for the Accused Make a Positive Statement to Have Nearly All the Evidence Expunged—Fonseca and Transmuting Beginning.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 18.—The state closed its testimony in the Cronin case today and the defence, without flourish, began the presentation of its side, after moving to strike out about everything the State had introduced showing the connection of the accused with the crime.

It seems to be the purpose of the defence to obtain for efforts that could be repeated in any attempt at the dramatic, and no one will deny that it has succeeded so far. Nothing more proceeds than its opening could be expected.

The feature of the day was the examination of the Herald special correspondent Mr. James Clancy, who was sent to Chicago by the New York Herald, shortly after the disappearance of Dr. Cronin to investigate the rumor about the murder of the Irish patriot.

It was the Herald which procured exclusively the now famous document at one of the charges made by Dr. Cronin and John Devoy against the triangle, and obtained, also exclusively, the affidavit of Haggerty relating to the implied threats and intensions of Alexander Sullivan against the Doctor.

Mr. Clancy gave a dramatic description of the fear, anxiety and perturbation of mind which he manifested when he was the correspondent suddenly announced the news of the finding of the body of Dr. Cronin in the catch basin and of the fact that they were under the protection that the recital had an influence on the jury.

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
