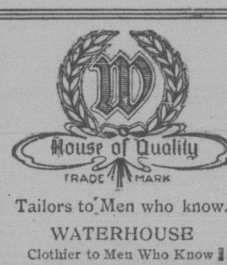

Writes Out For Election.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—Sir James Whitney announced yesterday that writs would be issued to-day for the by-elections to take place in East Middlesex and North Waterloo constituencies. The nominations for both seats will be held on October 21 and the elections on October 28.

Hon. Mackenzie King's name is being mentioned as a possibility for Liberal nomination in the North Waterloo seat, vacated by the resignation of Dr. Lachner, M.P.P. It is not considered to be likely, however, that he would accept, and W. D. Euler, who contested the riding last December, will probably be the Liberal nominee. In Conservative ranks R. Reid, O. H. Mills and Simon Bricker of Waterloo have an equal showing, but it will be left for the convention to decide.

Miners For 8-Hour Day.

Kingsport, Oct. 1.—Samuel Price, commissioner appointed by the Ontario Legislature, has been here investigating into conditions of work at various mines and interviewing miners on their opinion of the 8-hour law as proposed. He found practically every miner in favor of the eight-hour day, while the operators, without an exception, were opposed to it. He has almost completed his tour of Ontario, and says this is the result of his findings at all points.

Crushed In Mine.

Bedford Mines, Que., Oct. 1.—A tragedy was killing while at work at the Bedford mines yesterday. He was stripping clay off the face of rock when a slide took place and he was crushed to death under several tons of earth.

A CANADIAN NAVY

Sir Wilfrid Reviews His National Defense Policy.

OPENS HIS ONTARIO TOUR

The Liberal Leader Addressing a Big Gathering at Cornwall Says That the Liberal Plan was Thoroughly Canadian and Fulfilled the Wishes of the Imperial Ministers at the Same Time.

Cornwall, Oct. 1.—In clear-cut, ringing tones Sir Wilfrid Laurier last night delivered his message on the naval problem. Faced by an audience estimated at between five and seven thousand cheering people in the big Cornwall rink, which was cleared of seats to enable the great gathering to be accommodated, the Liberal Chief Minister dealt freely and frankly with the question. Repeatedly he was interrupted by outbreaks of enthusiasm and applause.

"We wait for the policy of the Government," said the Liberal leader, "and will judge it on its merits—on its merits, I repeat. We will support it if it is right, and oppose it if it is wrong, but the judgment shall be given upon merit, and not upon passion or prejudice."

"In the meantime—and while we continue to wait, and wait, and wait along—our policy is a Canadian navy, built in Canada, equipped in Canada, manned in Canada, under the control of the Canadian Parliament and the Canadian people, and ready if Britain should ever be in danger—I will not say that—Britain should ever be on trial—to do its part, as a loyal daughter of the old Motherland."

Sir Wilfrid was gratified to learn that at last Mr. Borden had come to a realization that Canada had become a nation. Nationhood involved the responsibilities of nationhood. It had an obligation in the defence of its own territory. Canada had a thousand miles of coast line on the Pacific which was absolutely defenceless, and a similar condition obtained on the Atlantic coast line.

When he visited the Imperial Conference in London in 1902 Sir Wilfrid had taken this matter up with the Imperial Government. The British Government represented that they would welcome action. "This we believed was right and proper," said Sir Wilfrid, "and we forthwith took over the defence of Halifax and Esquimaux, and took the ground that as we developed in wealth and population we would undertake a navy of our own."

In concluding his address, the Liberal leader dealt briefly with the justification of the Senate in amending the Government highways and subsidies bills.

Hon. Messrs. Murphy and Graham concluded the meeting with vigorous speeches.

DIPLOMAS PRESENTED TO NURSES; GRADUATED FROM TRAINING SCHOOL

Town Hall Taxed to the Limit of its Capacity at the First Graduating Exercises in Connection With the Alexandra Hospital—Miss Siple and Miss Hayward Receive Diplomas and Cases of Instruments

Miss Ethel M. Siple and Miss Lillian Hayward enjoy the distinction of being the first nurses to graduate from the training school for nurses in connection with the Alexandra Hospital. The graduating exercises were held in the town hall last evening, when one of the largest audiences that has ever assembled there, reflected the keen interest that has been manifested in the hospital since its establishment three years ago. The hall was taxed to the limit of its capacity, a fact that was also a tribute to the popularity of the successful nurses. That interest in the hospital is not confined to the town was very evident by the large attendance from nearby districts.

It was a proud occasion not only for the nurses to whom diplomas were presented, but to Miss Hodges, Superintendent of the Hospital, and all others who are identified with the institution. Mayor Coleridge occupied the chair and the evening proved intensely interesting, a splendid program having been arranged consisting of addresses in keeping with the occasion and vocal and instrumental music of a very high order.

Several of the speakers recalled the fact that at the meeting three years ago at which the hospital project was launched only nineteen persons were present. From that time, however, there had been a rapid growth of interest in the institution which to-day ranks among the best of the country. In the course of his remarks the chairman expressed absolute confidence in the staff of the hospital and paid a warm tribute to the excellent work of Miss Hodges, the Superintendent, and the nurses.

A solo by Mrs. Dr. Rogers was rendered in excellent voice and was a feature in which everyone enjoyed. Dr. McKay, President of the Medical Staff of the hospital, discussed the wonderful advancement of medical science during the past twenty years and the need of the splendid assistance of the nurses of Ingersoll had rendered at the hospital. They could always be depended upon to discharge their duties faithfully and to do so with the greatest efficiency at what time of the day or night they were called upon.

Rev. Alfred Bright held up several high ideals for the nursing profession, and in the conclusion of his address congratulated the graduates in every respect. He enumerated and emphasized many of the qualities which the nurse must possess, among them being: tenderness, love, sympathy and cheerfulness. Mr. Bright's address was a thoughtful one, in every respect appropriate to the occasion and contained much food for thought, not only for those engaged in the nursing profession, but people generally.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

That the partition of Persia had been proposed during the recent Anglo-Russian conference was denied by the British Foreign Office yesterday. The most destructive fire in the history of Sackville, N.B., occurred yesterday, and many buildings were burned or damaged, with a loss of \$60,000. The Marchioness of Dufferin presided at a meeting of women in Ulster held at Belfast in opposition to the partition of Ireland. The population of Sackville is 1,338 in the population of St. Catharines, and an increase of \$2,555,292 in the assessment during the past year is reported. The population now totals 14,741.

Anatole Poincaré, formerly commercial agent of the Canadian Government in France, committed suicide in Paris by blowing out his brains, following the death of his wife. A considerable portion of his population as the result of an extreme shortage of workingmen's homes, is the information forthcoming from a well-informed source.

B. J. McCormick, industrial commissioner, yesterday concluded arrangements for the location at North Welland of a large steel industry to be known as the Standard Steel Construction Co. The Hamilton Council, by a vote of 11 to 10, yesterday decided to join with other municipalities in petitioning the Ontario Government to give them power to exempt improvements to a certain extent from taxation, and to assess land at its full market value.

Canada's Big Trade

Ottawa, Oct. 1.—The first four months of the current fiscal year show an increase of nearly eighty million dollars in Canada's trade. The trade in the four months aggregated \$325,630,244, as compared with \$249,051,736 in the corresponding period. Exports totalled \$117,870,337, an increase of \$31,697,599, and imports for domestic consumption totalled \$207,759,907, an increase of \$22,966,668. Domestic exports totalled \$107,208,036, an increase of \$29,044,820. By nearly \$2,900,000 exports of agriculture increased. Of manufactures the increase is two millions and of minerals four and a half millions.

Looking For Wife Deserters.

Ottawa, Oct. 1.—Sir George McRae, chairman of the Local Government Board of Scotland, arrived in Ottawa yesterday. He is touring Canada looking into cases wherein old countrymen have deserted their wives and come to this country. There are said to be thousands of such cases in the Dominion. He wishes to further an arrangement between Canada and Scotland by which husbands may be deported, or failing that, that they should contribute to the support of their spouses.

"In the city of Glasgow alone," said Sir George, "the number of wives and children deserted last year was 970, which cost the city no less than \$41,250."
