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THIRD EDITION. THE PEACE OF THE WORLD. SALISBURY BELIEVES THE NATIONS WILL WORK IN HARMONY.

More on Account of Kindred Interests, the Premier says, that of the War. Paper Ties—The Land Act a Permanent Cause for the Troubles.

London, July 31.—The labors of the peace conference of Parliament were reviewed by Lord Salisbury in his speech at the lord mayor's banquet. He rejoiced at the passage of the education bill. Regarding Ireland he said the government had applied a successful remedy to a long suffering people, and could look back on its policy with satisfaction.

Five years ago he had expressed the belief that Ireland must be governed separately. Mr. Balfour's success was largely due to the fact that those serving under him were assured that they would be supported, and not handed over to their enemies. Mr. Balfour's administration over his success to persistence and resolution. (Cheers.) "Respect for the law followed, the people feeling that the justice of the law was being done."

"The land act," Lord Salisbury declared, "would be found not to be a temporary palliative, but a permanent cure, for the troubles of many generations. It would draw closer the bond uniting the people of the Empire. It would be a step towards the peace of the world."

Referring to foreign powers, Lord Salisbury said he never knew a period when Europe was so much in harmony as at the present time. The English government had been pressed to arbitrate in the Chilean dispute and in the adjustment of the Argentine finances, but England could not undertake either task.

Referring to the Eastern question, Lord Salisbury said the dispute had not yet been solved, but that Egypt and Bulgaria were showing such rapid development that they promised to settle the difficulty without any external interference.

The premier next spoke of the value of the visit of Emperor William and the Prince of Wales in settling the world of the peaceful life of the great power. He said he hoped in the course of a week, to welcome the emperor and the prince of the French republic. (Cheers.) There had been talk, he continued, of certain work in harmony with each other—more on account of their kindred interests than on account of mere paper treaties.

Referring to the sea and lobster disputes, Lord Salisbury said they dragged their slow length along with the calmness and serenity suitable to those animals. It was useless, he added, to imagine that the industry of catching lobsters would be a source of any year for a considerable number of years.
