PARIS, Nov. 29.—All sorts of amusing stories going the rounds about extraordinary attempts by Count Boni de Castellane to keep his head above water.

One report had him parliamentary secretary to a political adversary. This is easily disproved by the fact that Boni is notoriously incapable of compiling even the least inspiring speeches or presenting an even mildly convincing argument. He himself paid the biggest sums ever known to a whole bureau of newspaper men to compose his scintillating speeches and write articles for him on foreign politics.

A second rumor credits him with supplying scandalous revelations in high life to a sensational journal for an enormous salary. His tit-bits are said to be spiced with all manner of slurs on the American element.

But perhaps the most probable and the most enjoyed of the on dits concerning the little Count is that he is taking commissions on men's clothes.

Boni was always an arbiter of masculine modes. His waistcoats have been the envy of those who paid the debt of flattery in immediate imitation. His jewelry was also copied and he made the reputation of his furnishers of the Rue de la Paix among the glided youth.

Now he will wear their gauds for other than personal satisfaction, and while purloining about in his gay plumage will pocket a handsome percentage.

His club friends are roaring over the story that Boni received an offer of \$10,000 to become head waiter at the Cafe Martin, New York.

But the keenest of all the Count's sufferings in his present extremity is the knowledge that he has become at last irretrievably ridiculous.

SHORTAGE OF COAL

FELT AT SPRINGHILL

The Boys From the Mines are Still on Strike—Manager's Cowards Threatens to Close up.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Nov. 29.—The labor trouble at Springhill, which has kept the colliers in idleness for more than a week, shows no signs of diminishing. The deadlock between the company and the striking boys continues. An effort was made by the boys' committee to revive negotiations, but Manager Cowans cut the interview short by telling them they knew how they came out of the mine and they could go back the same way. Mr. Cowans said: "We own the works, we pay the wages, we have some right to say where and how our employees shall work."

The manager states that the C. P. R. and the I. C. R. are well stocked for two or three months, and many of their smaller customers have enough for several months. There is also plenty in stock for use of the colliers, therefore, he contemplates closing the mine for the rest of the year unless the boys go to work. This is causing the inhabitants to view the situation with much alarm, and evokes much talk about "blue" Christmas and cheerless homes.

The town cannot obtain any more coal from the local company, and a number of merchants joined in an order for one car of coal, which is expected to arrive from Chignecto tomorrow.

CONCERNING MEXICO.

Mrs. James F. Robertson delivered an interesting and instructive address on Mexico before a gathering of ladies in the Natural History rooms yesterday afternoon. She spoke of the different cities and money making centres in Mexico. One man in Yucatan made \$20,000,000 in a few days through the cultivation of the steel plant.

There are three elevations in Mexico. First the flat lands, where the temperature seldom falls below 80 degrees. Second, the table land, where the temperature is most exhilarating and third the cold region in the mountains.

Mrs. Robertson described the beautiful buildings in the City of Mexico. She also stated that the form of government there was excellent. Diaz, the President, is beloved by all, and the Czar of Russia is no greater autocrat. Many interesting relics are to be seen in the Mexican museums.

Mrs. Robertson concluded her lecture by describing the every-day customs of the people of Mexico.
