Chief Justice said that he considered the judge's charge about as strong an argument could have been. Judges Haningtan ond McLeod were quite as emphate in their views, and that as fregards the finding of the jury they thought that in some of the most important inferences what the jury should have been instructed on to data from the evidence, the jury were told to take as proven. Judge McLeod said to his mind the most important point was to the finding of the axe in the room after a search had been made and might raise a reasonable doubt in any one's mind as to guilt. This point seems to have been regarded as immaterial in the Judge's charge as regards the connection of the one who committed the theft with the one who committed the murder came in for some strong criticism. 

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

McVey the First to Leave the Sinking Vessel, With a Picked Safety Seemed Advised the Women Children to Jump.

element was injected into the horror attending the loss of the steamer Larchmont in Block Island Sound Monday night through a collision with the coal-laden schooner Harry Knowlton, when Capt. McVey, of the steamer, early today admitted that his lifeboat was one of the first, if not the first, to leave the sinking ship. This statement was made in reply to charges by Fred. Hiergsell, an 18 year old lad of Brooklyn, one of the survivors. Hiergsell stated that the passengers were left to shift for themselves, that the ship's crew crowded the boats without attempting to provide for the passengers and that Captain McVey was the first to desert the ship. These statements of young Hiergsell created a sensation in view of the fact that ten of the 19 survivors were employes on the ship, or in other words that ten of the vessel's crew were saved but only 9 of the passengers. Captain McVey explained that while his boat may have been in the water first it was because he had a good crew, and despite that he was the first off the deck he remained by the ship until she went down. WARM CONTESTS COMING IN THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

IONDON, Feb. 14—The first business day of the present session of parliament has given evidence of important legislative matters in hand and promise of vigorous political fighting. Augustine Birrell's maiden speech as Chief Secretary for Ireland, highly pleased the Nationalists, and supplies the text for strong attacks by oppositions newspapers this morning. Mr. Birrell has frankly avowed himself a "heme ruler" and confessed that the government's devolution bills would be a stepping stone to home rule, The Daily Telegraph in an editorial article this morning says that truth like murder will out and Mr. Birrell with childlike simplicity has disclosed the real Irish policy of the government.
