GEORGE PRITCHARD.
MILTO, Sunbury Co., April 3. -- At 8.30 a. m. on Monday, George Pritchard, a young immigrant 18 years of age, died from typhoid pneumonia. He came to Canada a short time ago, under the impression that a ticket to Winnipeg and a good job was waiting for him. He had been taken ill by some one who sent him to this country by false representations. On arriving here he went to a boarding house where he was charged four dollars for a night's lodging. After this he possessed only a few cents, but did not become discouraged. He looked about for a job but typhoid pneumonia seized him and he was not fit to walk. J. T. Kennedy kindly took the unfortunate to his hotel where he was well cared for. A trained nurse was hired and a physician engaged, but young Pritchard's condition was too serious and he breathed his last on Monday morning.

ATHLETIC INTERCOLLEGIATE MATCH.

The postponed meeting of the delegates from three maritime colleges--U. N. B., Acadia and Mount Allison--arrange an intercollegiate athletic meet, was held on Wednesday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. rooms here. The representatives being H. S. Day, T. M. Clindin and W. H. Hutchison.
A date and place for the meet was not definitely decided, but the choice is between Truro and St. Stephen, and the date favored is May 24.
The question was left with a faculty executive composed of a professor from each college, who will be appointed by the athletic associations. So much difficulty has been experienced in arranging for the meet that it is possible that in future, following the lead of Upper Canada colleges, the sports will be held in the fall.

NEW YORK, April 4--With the exception of the testimony of one more witness who is expected to reach New York in time to testify tomorrow, the plaintiff in the Lou Dillon-Major Delmar gold cup suit completed its case and the defense began the introduction of testimony today. The Memphis Trotting Association seeks to recover the cup awarded E. F. Smathers after his gelding, Major Delmar, had beaten Lou Dillon, owned by C. K. G. Billings, in a match race about two years ago.

Robert McCully, a veteran, testifying for the plaintiff today, in answer to a hypothetical question, based upon evidence submitted at the present trial, said that in his opinion the mare referred to in the question did not stop from natural causes on the day of the race, and that some drug such as acetonite must have been administered.

Former Judge Coyne in his opening address for the defense declared that evidence would be offered to show that the charges of drugging brought by George Spears were not made until Spears had been discharged by Smathers and had failed to blackmail him.
J. H. Schrieber, formerly state veterinarian of Tennessee, took the stand for the defense and testified that he attacked Lou Dillon at the time of her attack and that she was suffering from "bumps" and added that they were not caused by acetonite.
The hearing will be continued tomorrow.

CHARGED WITH STEALING A TRAY OF JEWELS

LONDON, April 4--A young man supposed to be an American living the name of William Henry Bruce has been remanded by the Brighton Magistrate on the charge of stealing a tray of rings of the value of \$29,000 from the window of a jeweller's shop.
The theft was described by the chief constable who stated that prices had two confederates, a woman and a man. Lewis and Son first and engaged an assistant in conversation. Then a man entered and engaged the attention of another assistant.
Bruce followed and was seen to take a tray of rings from the window and hurriedly leave the shop. He was followed by one of the assistants and seen to enter a house nearby. A policeman was summoned and the man was arrested, forty-six of the forty-seven rings on the tray being recovered.
