SCHEME FOR NEW YORK

NEW YORK, March 9—The scramble for rapid transit railroad rights in New York City took a fresh turn today when William J. Wilgus, formerly vice-president of the New York Central R. R., presented to the public service commission plans for an extensive "inter-terminal belt line" which he and a number of associates propose to build for the transportation of both passengers and freight.

The proposed line, which includes both elevated and subway roads at various portions of its route, practical-

both elevated and subway roads at various portions of its route, practically circles the city, taking in the entire water-front, and touching also the Grand Central Station and the Pennsylvania's new terminal. The scheme has the backing, it is said, of foreign capital. The cost will probably be between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000.
