IN FAVOR OF MANUAL TRAINING

Wednesday evening a well attended public meeting was held at St. Martin's to hear an address on the subject of manual training, by Mr. T. B. Kidner, Provincial Director of Manual Training Schools.

Mr. W. E. Skillen presided and in his opening remarks spoke of the need for a practical trend in education. Inspector R. P. Steeves was then called upon and spoke of the excellent effect upon which manual training has had upon the other subjects of his inspectorate.

He said that while nine years ago Manual Training and its related subject, Household Science, were practically unknown in the Maritime Provinces, today more than seventy departments were to be found there.

Principal Barker, who had been experimenting with the subject in the St. Martin's school with the aid of a small equipment loaned by the Board of Education, spoke of the general benefits he had found accruing from the work and displayed an excellent assortment of specimens of his pupils' skill in woodworking, raffin work, etc.

Rev. Mr. Manuel and Messrs. Rourke, Hodson and others also spoke and expressed themselves as strongly in favor of the establishment of a department of Manual Training in the town schools.

POLICE ORDERLY BOYS OF CITY

The conduct of some of the boys of the city seems to be growing from bad to worse. About two weeks ago some fifteen boys were reported for acting disorderly at the foot of Clarence street; another crowd were reported for breaking windows in the Jewish Synagogue on Carleton street; about a week ago a lad was arrested for being one of a disorderly crowd of boys on Charles street; and on Sunday last a boy was arrested for shouting and playing ball in the lane off Cliff street, and still another, for last evening Officer Crawford succeeded in capturing a sixteen-year-old boy, named Harold Patterson.

The residents of Charles street, Cliff street, Brussels street, and many other sections of the city report that the boys are very noisy both on Sunday night and week nights, and they feel that something should be done at once to prevent its recurrence.

Thus far the boys have not been molested, but have been severely reprimanded by the magistrate. In the police court, a few days ago, Judge Ritchie spoke of the extreme necessity of public playgrounds, as the city at present have no place at all to play, and they must enjoy themselves.

Patterson will appear in the police court this morning and the situation will no doubt once more attract the magistrate's attention. What is going to be done about the matter?
