During the evening telegrams were read from former St. John residents who had been prominent in the affairs of the church, including one from C. E. Vall, of Halifax.

The Associated Charities.
The annual meeting of the Associated Charities will be held on Thursday evening next, in the board of trade rooms, when reports will be received and there will be election of officers. Three interesting subjects will be discussed at the meeting. Rev. R. A. Armstrong, rector of Trinity church, will speak on the need of a children's protective act in New Brunswick. This act is in effect in Ontario, and an endeavor will be made to have the same for New Brunswick. Commissioner Miles R. Agre will speak on the need of a prison farm for a certain class of offenders. Dr. Thomas Walker will address the meeting on the need of care for the feeble minded. It is expected that with the discussion of these important subjects, the attendance at the meeting will be large.

Report of Grand Scribe Reviews Work of Year and Recommends Discussion of Reforms for Benefit of Humanity.
The 6th annual meeting of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance for New Brunswick, was opened yesterday afternoon in Christadelphian Hall, Grand Worthy Patriarch R. H. Staver, of Harcourt, N. B., presiding. Other officers of the grand division present were: Jas. Falkner, G. W. A. Wille, Blackford, Chatham, Black River, Napan, Quarryville. Divisions were reorganized at River Louis, Doak, Lower, Riverside, New Jersey, Harper Brook, Point de Bute, Middle Sackville and Bathurst.

Gains in Membership.
The grand scribe, Rev. W. R. Robinson in his report, gave an encouraging resume of the year. Its membership there had been considerable gains, the good work had been done by all the sub-divisions, and all through the province the future prospects looked bright for the order, not for years has there been displayed such aggressive work among the members.
The order has succeeded during the year in having enforced with marked success, the liquor license act, the Canada temperance act, the laws against gambling and vice.
The attitude of the general public towards the order, the Grand Scribe reported, has not been one of tolerance alone, but of sympathetic approval which he hoped would eventually become a reality.

Local Manufacturers May Install Oil Plants.
Local manufacturers are looking into the possibilities of the oil and gas engine as a means of solving the problem of securing cheap power. One manufacturer informed The Standard that he expected to put in an oil engine shortly, using kerosene. He said that according to the figures given him a 25 horsepower engine would develop power at a cost of about \$19 per horsepower per year. He considered a kerosene engine would be more economical than a gasoline engine, as the price of kerosene was 14 cents a gallon, while gasoline was now about 22 cents.
