While the soldier boys are working pretty hard at present they find lots of time for recreation, football and baseball clubs are being formed and various other modes of amusement will be introduced later on. That they are putting in pretty busy days at present may be gleaned by a glance at the following sample bill of fare of a day's routine work which was carried out on Wednesday:

In anticipation of a bigger camp and with the idea of having discipline on the military grounds rigidly enforced, if necessary, a guard house is under course of construction, seventy-seven feet long by twenty feet in width, which will be provided with cells, and other appliances for taking care of the unruly, be he either soldier or civilian as the case may be. Col. Kirkpatrick and Major H. S. Jones, who are second in command and all the officers are determined that nothing will occur at Camp Sussex that will mar the good name of the 55th. If the recruits come in are of the quality of those now in camp, the guard house will not be very well patronized, as the men appear to enter into the spirit displayed by their officers of desiring efficiency, and a good name for the battalion.

REV. M. SHEWEN NEW
RECTOR OF TRINITY
CHURCH AT SUSSEX

Sussex, N. B., May 13.—A parishioner's meeting was held at the Medley Memorial Hall on Monday evening to take into consideration the election of a rector to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Rev. Canon Neales, now Dean of Cathedral at Fredericton.

There was a large attendance from Sussex Parish (Trinity Church), a number of the St. John's Parish (Apothah Church) present. The name of Rev. Mansel Shewen of Kingsclear was put in nomination by W. J. Mills. No other nomination being made a vote was taken which resulted in the unanimous election of Rev. Mr. Shewen, which was further confirmed by a standing vote.

The Rev. Mansel Shewen is a native of New Brunswick, and is between 39 and 40 years of age. He was educated at Mt. Allison and pursued his theological studies at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, P.Q., and entered the Church of England ministry some years ago. He was stationed for a time at Oak Point on St. John river, and later has been doing duty as rector of Kingsclear, a few miles above Fredericton. He is a clever speaker, and an energetic worker in church matters generally, and wherever known has won hosts of friends by his genial and affable manner and beyond any doubt Sussex and Apoahai will have no cause to regret the choice made. Though the congregations of Trinity and Apoahai churches deeply regretted the departure of Rev. Canon Neales they feel that the incoming rector may find his acceptance of the rectory one well worthy of his best efforts, and that the same good feeling that existed during the eighteen years of Canon Neales' will continue in the time to come.
