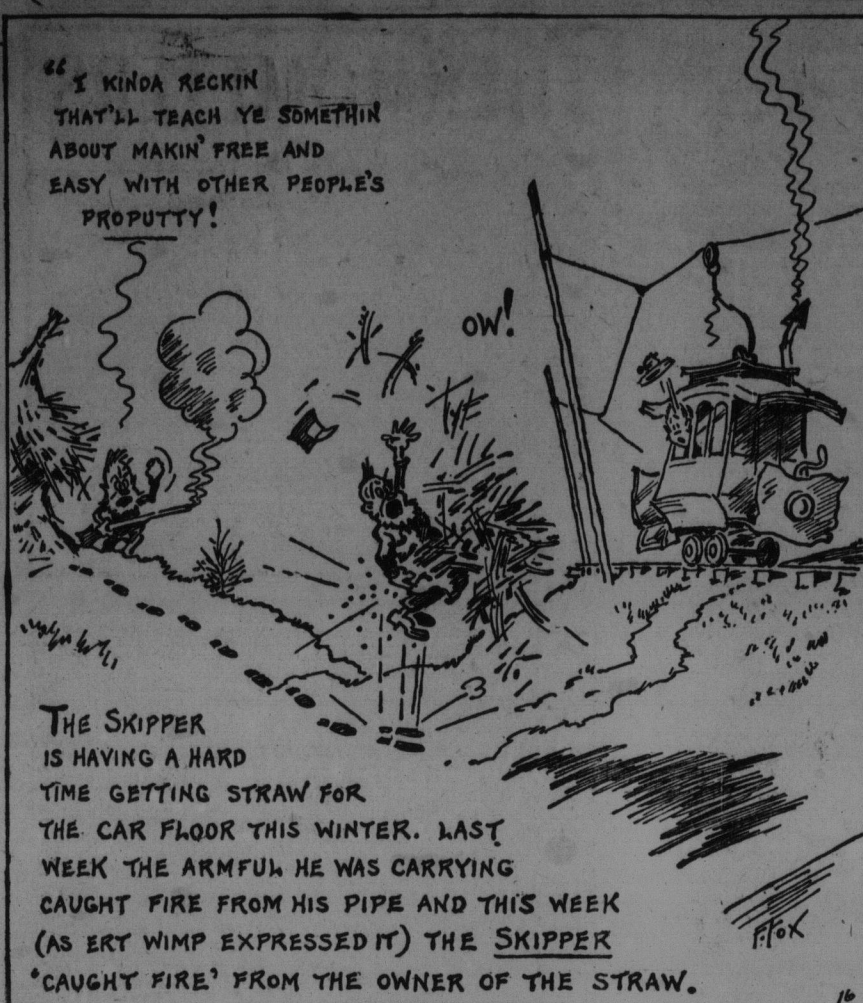

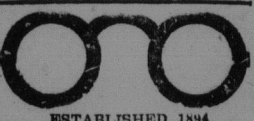

POLICE COURT CASES YESTERDAY

In the Police Court, yesterday, Patrick Murphy was charged with neglecting his two children, and after some evidence had been heard he was remanded to jail.

William McAteer, who was arrested on a warrant for alleged assault on his wife, pleaded guilty and was remanded.

One man, arrested on a charge of drunkenness, was fined \$8 and warned that he was liable to a fine of \$68 or four months in jail.

Fred Agley, a young Englishman, who was arrested some time ago on suspicion of stealing an overcoat from the Y. M. C. A., was sent up for trial. Three men charged with theft were remanded for a further hearing.

The case of a man charged with non-support by his wife was adjourned for one month. A reconciliation will probably be effected between the two parties.

Common Council Met In Committee

Total of \$25,500 in Grants Made Yesterday, Including \$15,000 Additional for Vocational Training, \$10,000 for Exhibition Assn. and \$500 for Anti-Tuberculosis Work.

At a committee meeting of the Common Council held yesterday morning a total of \$25,500 in grants was made, including \$15,000 additional for vocational training, \$10,000 for the Exhibition Association, and \$500 for anti-tuberculosis work.

Dr. Emery, chairman, and Mrs. W. E. Raymond, Mrs. Richard O'Brien, Thomas Nagle, J. D. P. Lewis, Alexander Wilson, G. P. Hennessey and A. Gordon Leavitt, of the Vocational Committee, urged additional financial support.

Dr. Emery said there were 1,000 students registered for the vocational classes and that the commercial classes had been held over on account of lack of accommodations. Citizens were most enthusiastic and optimistic about the courses. He advised that instead of \$5,000, at least \$12,000 would be required properly to operate the classes.

St. John should have a vocational training building for next year. The Oddfellows' building could be secured for \$28,000. Dr. Emery expressed the hope that eventually the whole block in which the Oddfellows' building is located could be secured.

Thomas Nagle, chairman of the finance committee, said \$20,000 additional would be required of Council to operate the classes for the year. If the vocational committee is limited to the \$5,000 already granted, the only thing to be done was to operate until the \$5,000 is used up and then close the classes.

He suggested that a suitable building be leased for a year or a term of years, with option to buy, to house the vocational classes.

After considerable discussion, on motion of Commissioner Bullock, an additional \$15,000 was placed in the estimates for vocational training. This makes a total of \$20,000 for the vocational courses.

On motion of Commissioner Thomson, \$10,000 was voted the Exhibition Association.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock, \$500 was voted the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock, the Barrett Company was given a lease to the western portion of the Anchor Line warehouse, at the will of the Commissioner of Harbors, at \$50 per month rental. The company proposes to operate a paper press there.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock, the lease of the James Pender Co. Ltd. to the land occupied by the company at the corner of Charlotte and Sydney streets, was renewed for seven years at an annual rate of \$250.

Commissioner Bullock presented copies of the proposed amendments to the harbor by-laws.

The amendments require: That no lighter, scow, or shall be placed or fastened alongside of any vessel at wharf or mooring buoy without permission of the harbor master. The penalty is \$20.

That disregard of orders of the harbor master in regard to the placing or fastening of any scow, lighter, etc., be subject to a penalty of \$100; further, that an additional \$25 per twenty-four hours operator for continued neglect or disobedience.

That in event of disobedience, refusal, resistance or neglect, the harbor master shall have authority to enter on any such vessel, with such assistance as he may require, and remove same, and shall have to conduct the enforcement at the expense of the owner of the lighter, scow, etc.

That no ballast, stone, ashes, etc., shall be unladen, discharged, deposited or thrown on the western side of the harbor in any lighter, scow or other vessel, under penalty of \$40.

The amendments also proposed include the following: That the Mill Pond, Carleton, be appointed and designated for the reception of ballast from vessels to be carried in conveyors.

The Mayor said he had a communication from the Board of Trade in regard to the Mill Pond, and that if he had known the amendments were coming up he would have presented the report.

On motion, the draft of the amendments were referred to the Common Council to be incorporated in the by-laws and report back.

Commissioner Bullock advised that the City Engineer was completing plans of flood gates, which would be recommended at the installation for the entrance to the Mill Pond to check the rise of tide and to prevent material from being washed out.
