Business Profit Tax Presents' a Problem

Admittedly a Handicap Upon Industry Besides Being a Source of Tremendous Work for Gov't Departments-Brings in \$35,000,000 Revenue.

Ottawa, Feb. 18 .- The problem of what to do with the business profit tax in Canada is engaging the attention of the Government, with no solu-tion for it immediately in sight. It is admittedly a handicap in industry. tion for it immediately in sign. It is admittedly a nanaccap in industry, besides being the source of tremendous work for Government departments in determining the exact part of a firm's profits which shall be assessed. But it brings in about \$35,000,000 a year to Canadian revenue, and such an amount cannot conveniently be added to the income tax on private in-
