From Rev. J. Robertson, dated Bridgetown, Jany. 7th, 1846.

"The General Committee will be glad to learn that an increasing interest in the success and usefulness of the Diocesan Church Society is daily manifesting itself in my mission, an interest which it is to be hoped will

long continue to be felt.

In proof of this I may mention that a worthy and zealous member of the Church, resident at Digby, has made a grant of land for the purpose of promoting the objects of the Society in the Parish of Wilmot. A deed making it over to the Rector and Corporation of Trinity Church is now in my possession and shall be regularly recorded at the earliest convenience. The land is stated in the deed to be intended for the future site of a Church and Parsonage."

From Rev. T. Maynard, dated Rawdon, Feby. 13th, 1846.

"The Committee at Douglas has been re-established, we had a most excellent meeting there, and the spirit evinced on the occasion was very gratifying. At Rawdon also I think there is a disposition to contribute to the funds of the Society all in their power, but the people speaking generally are very poor. May God in His mercy grant that our contributions however small, may be given with the prayerful desire that they shall advance the interests of the Kedeemer's Kingdom upon earth, and be made the means of carrying the knowledge of salvation to some of those who are sitting in darkness and in the shadow of death. Oh! if we all felt more deeply the vast importance of the work in which we are engaged, and with even our pence gave also our heartfelt faithful prayers that God would be pleased to pour out His Spirit upon us, what might not, yea! what would not the merest mite effect."

From Rev. T. H. White, dated Shelburne, 7th February, 1846.

"The claims of our Diocesan Society were laid before the congregations of the 'Church of the Resurrection' and the Parish Church on the morning and evening of the 25th ult., and collections made, the results of which is the sum of twenty pounds, nearly double you perceive of our last years remittance. This has been a heartfelt gratification to myself, for it shows that a sense of the duty and privilege of caiding in such a holy cause as that which the Society has in view, the cause of 'Christ and His Church,' is on the increase among us, and God of His mercy grant that a true Christian zeal on this subject may pervade every heart, until each and every individual may offer unto the Lord of his substance as God hath blessed him; 'he that hath much give plenteously, and he that hath little do his diligence gladly to give of that little.' I could mention two or three very touching and interesting circumstances connected with the gifts that have been cast into the Lord's treasury in this mission, but the fear of wounding pious feeling compels me to forbear. Among the names
